SUBJECT: WORKFORCE HOUSING GRANT: CONFIRMATION OF PROJECTS

DATE: AUGUST 16, 2005

Needs: For the City Council to determine a prioritized list of eligible projects to be accomplished or assisted with Workforce Housing (WFH) Grant funds.

Facts:

- 1. On June 30, 2005, the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) awarded the City \$258,634 in WFH Grant funds. A copy of the grant award letter is attached.
 - 2. The City had qualified for this grant, which is funded via Proposition 46 (2002), as a reward for:
 - a. Having an HCD-approved Housing Element;
 - b. Having submitted an annual Housing Element Progress Report to HCD by October 31, 2004;
 - c. Having given "final land use approval" and issued a building permit, in Calendar Year 2004, to a housing project reserved for low income households. The qualifying housing project was Canyon Creek Apartments (Peoples Self-Help Housing Corp.'s 68 unit low income apartments oat 400 Oak Hill Road). "Final land use approval" consisted of Planning Division's determination that the building plans were in substantial conformance with the conditions of approval for PD 98016.
 - 3. WFH funds may be used for such projects as:
 - Construction of a cultural center;
 - Library development;
 - Street improvements for safety, such as lights, curbs and gutters;
 - Upgrades to existing infrastructure such as water/sewer upgrades;
 - Park improvements, construction and rehabilitation;
 - Accommodations for ADA compliance; and/or
 - Assisting low income housing.
 - 4. On March 1, 2005, as part of the grant application process, by minute action, the City Council adopted a prioritized list of four projects. At that time, it was anticipated that the grant would be \$135,000.
 - 5. Projects to be funded and/or assisted with WFH funds must be completed by June 30, 2008 (three years from the date of grant award) or the City may lose its award of WFH funds. Additionally, the City must demonstrate commitment to use the WFH funds by June 30, 2006.
 - 6. HCD is currently preparing the grant agreement. This would be an appropriate time for Council to either reconfirm the list of projects approved on March 1 or revise the list. Options will be discussed in the Analysis section of this report.

Analysis and Conclusion:

The 4 projects identified by the Council on March 1, in prioritized order, were:

1.	LED-Lighted Crosswalk at 34 th and Spring Streets	\$70,000
	LED-Lighted Crosswalk at 17th and Spring Streets	
	Curbs, gutters, sidewalk adjacent to Fairgrounds Parking Lot	
	Paving, curbs, gutters, sidewalk (one side) on Vine St, between	
	Marion Avenue and 36th Street	\$365.000

Projects do not need to be fully-accomplished with WFH funds. The City may use supplementary funds (e.g. CDBG, General Funds, etc.)

LED-Lighted Crosswalks

The City has already allocated \$75,000 in CDBG funds for the LED-Lighted Crosswalk at 34th and Spring Streets. The intersection of 17th and Spring Streets is eligible for using CDBG funds.

The Police Chief is interested in installing LED-Lighted Crosswalks in several locations on the East Side of the City, where CDBG funds cannot be used. A preliminary list of such locations would be:

- Creston Road at Daniel Lewis Middle School/Ivy Lane;
- Creston Road at Winifred Pifer School/Lana Street;
- Creston Road at Virginia Peterson School/Meadowlark Road;
- Nicklaus Road at Pat Butler School;
- Creston Road at Ferro Lane;
- Creston Road at Bolen Drive.

Additionally, City staff is receiving verbal reports from other cities that they are satisfied with recent generations of wireless LED-lighted crosswalks, which cost substantially less to install than the hard-wired systems. A subsequent report on the wireless option will be presented to the Council in September.

Oak Park Senior Housing

A project that the Council may wish to consider adding to the list is the installation of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, and a street light on the 28th Street frontage of the approved 40 unit Oak Park Senior Housing Project. The Paso Robles Nonprofit Housing Corp. does not have any funds budgeted for the off-site improvements. This project, estimated to cost \$167,000, has been added to the attached list of projects for Option A. It is suggested, however, that its listing be subject to issuance of a building permit by December 31, 2005, so that any further delays in this project do not jeopardize the ability to use WFH funds.

Options

- A. Revise the list of projects to add off-site improvements for the Oak Park Senior Housing Project as first priority and to make a single project description for LED-lighted crosswalks (at a total of \$140,000) to be placed in locations to be confirmed by the City Council at a future date.
- B. Reconfirm that the list of projects and relative priorities identified by the Council on March 1 is the desired schedule.

The project costs need not match the WFH Grant amount. The City could spend less on a project than the estimated cost, and remaining WFH funds could be allocated to assist other projects. What would be important is that identified projects progress towards construction, so that a commitment to use the WFH funds can be demonstrated by June 30, 2006. HCD has advised that

	"demonstration of commitment" may take several forms, such as budgeting a project, executing a contract for design or construction, or actually drawing down the funds.
	WFH funds are generally disbursed on a reimbursement basis. The City may request advance funds only if it uses them within 90 days.

Fiscal Impact:	WFH funds would either accomplish, or supplement funding for, projects that supplement projects that would otherwise be carried out with General Funds.

	 Install LED-lighted crosswalk at 34th and Spring Streets
	c. Amend, modify or reject the foregoing option.

The Department is pleased to announce the City of Paso Robles as a recipient of a Workforce Housing Reward Grant Program (WFH Program) award. Funding for the WFH Program is available pursuant to the Housing and Emergency Shelter Trust Fund Act of 2002 (Proposition 46). The goal of the WFH Program is to encourage new housing affordable to lower-income households and to reward local governments for approving housing projects affordable to lowerincome households and the workforce. The WFH Program reflects the Department's commitment to work in partnership with local governments to address California's critical housing and community development needs.

As you know, all local government applicants who approved new affordable housing units and are in compliance with State housing element law, are awarded WFH Program grant funds for use in any local capital improvement projects. Your City's application indicated that the City of Paso Robles met the program requirements and has implemented the objective of the WFH Program, approving new housing affordable to lower-income households. The WFH Program recognizes and reinforces the critical linkages between housing and jobs, housing and the economy, and housing and vital, livable communities.

This letter constitutes a conditional commitment of grant funds in the amount of \$241,767. This amount is less than applied for because total requests exceeded the amount available. Pursuant to Section 50544(d) of the Health and Safety Code, if application requests exceed the available funding amount, the per unit incentives must be prorated. The program was oversubscribed by \$15.1 million; therefore the grant amounts for all applications have been adjusted.

Given California's critical housing shortage, the WFH Program also rewards local governments who are on track to meet their Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA) goals. We are pleased to award the City of Paso Robles \$16,867 in RHNA bonus grant funds for its significant efforts to meet its overall housing needs.
