ANALYSIS &

CONCLUSION: The Committee's financial reports do not clearly indicate that 75th Anniversary expenses will exceed prior years. The report of fund-raising to date would appear short of typical Parade expense requirements.

Inasmuch as the records do not clearly indicate that City financial support would "enhance" the 75th Parade anniversary, the matter is re-presented for Council consideration.
