PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. Appeal of Planning Commission Denial of Conditional Use Permit 07-009 R. Whisenand, Community Development Director The City Council considered an appeal of a denial of a Conditional Use Permit to establish a Bed & Breakfast business at 1521 Vine Street. **CONTINUED FROM AUGUST 7, 2007.**

Councilmember Nemeth and Mayor Mecham disclosed separate *ex parte* discussions with the applicant. Mayor Mecham opened the public hearing. 2. Street Abandonment 07-002 - 34th Street (Jeffrey)

3. Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program

The Police Department intends to use the funds to purchase new AR-15 rifles and accessories to replace old, antiquated rifles in its patrol fleet. The budget for this program will allow for six new rifles to be installed in over half of the current patrol fleet. These are "entitlement" funds and do not require matching funds from the City's budget.

16. Request to Remove One Oak Tree at 3328 Spring Street OTR 07-005 R. Whisenand, Community Development Director

The City Council considered a request by Paso Robles Spring Street LLC to remove one 6inch oak tree in the 34th Street frontage of a proposed mixed use development (58 unit senior condo, and 5,300 s.f. of commercial space) located at 3328 Spring Street (former Paso Robles Ford Dealership site).

Mayor Mecham opened the public hearing. There were no comments from the public, either written or oral, and the public discussion was closed.

Councilmember Nemeth, seconded by Councilmember Hamon, moved to adopt Resolution No. 07-190 approving OTR 07-005, allowing the removal of a 6-inch Live Oak tree to allow construction of improvements or otherwise allow reasonable use of the property, and require two replacement trees.

17. Prisoner Litigation Reform Act – Request to Intervene

L. Solomon, Chief of Police

The City Council considered authorizing the Chief of Police to enter into a legal motion to intervene along with other state Police Chiefs, Sheriffs, and other various state officials against the federal Prison Litigation Reform Act (PLRA).

Under the PLRA, an appointed three-judge court can issue an order establishing a cap on the number of inmates to be incarcerated in the state prison system (thereby limiting the ability of county sheriffs to transfer inmates sentenced to state time) and/or order the immediate release of up to 40,000 prisoners.

Mayor Mecham opened the public hearing. There were no further comments from the public, either written or oral, and the public discussion was closed.

Councilmember Hamon, seconded by Councilmember Nemeth, moved to authorize the Chief of Police, as well as other state law enforcement agencies, to enter into a legal motion to intervene against the federal Prison Litigation Reform Act (PLRA).

18. Integrated Water Resource Plan: Wastewater Quality Control

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ATTENTION HOMEOWNERS... ...THE DETENTION BASIN NEEDS YOUR HELP!!!



As many of you have already noticed the grass in the detention basin at the corner of Cool Valley and Oriole is turning brown and dying. Soon...plants, shrubs, and trees will follow.

Why is this happening? Due to a Landscaping & Lighting budget deficit the maintenance and watering of the basin has been discontinued effective July 1st.

What can you do to help? Agree to increase the Landscaping & Lighting maximum assessment rate from \$101.66 to \$318.00/year.

HISTORY: The Landscaping & Lighting assessment rate for 44 homes in our Sub Area 2A-1 was established in 1990. It has remained at this rate ever since. The city could have increased it at any time, but chose not to. Then in 1996 per the requirements of Proposition 218, the City could not alter the rate unless here was a majority vote by the homeowners. Property owners have voted against an increase twice, but now the City can no longer maintain the basin due to insufficient funds.

IMPACT: The deterioration and eventual demise of the basin will certainly have a negative impact upon the overall look of <u>your</u> neighborhood.

FACTS: Our Sub Area is also part of Zone 2. In this zone there are 448 homes and assessment rates range from \$100/year to \$750/year. According to the City, all 44 homes in our Sub Area are paying \$101.66 for this assessment. We are definitely paying the lowest rate and the City simply cannot afford to maintain and water certain areas. The water basin is one of the "first to go." In a few years the shared areas of Zone 2 (i.e. landscaping along Meadowlark and Airport Roads) may also be affected due to lack of funds.

Some may say, "The City is doing so well and has so much money? But money in the General Fund cannot be used for maintenance and watering. Money must come from the maximum assessment rate approved by homeowners. Only you can make a difference to keep your neighborhood looking the best it can be. We ask that you sign a petition approving an increase in your Landscaping & Lighting assessment rate.

I approve of the proposed Landscaping & Lighting maximum assessment rate of \$318 per year for my property and the annual inflation adjustment applicable to future assessments based on the annual percentage change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

COMMITTEE OF DENTAL PROFESSIONALS OPPOSED TO A DENTAL HYGIENE SCHOOL AT CUESTA COLLEGE SAN LUIS OBISPO, CALIFORNIA

The California State Employment Development Department has determined economic growth in Central California will result in nine new full-time dental hygiene jobs per year in Kings County, Monterey County, San Luis Obispo County, and Santa Barbara County combined.

As recently as four or five years ago there was a shortage of dental hygienists in San Luis Obispo County, and dozens of help-wanted advertisements would be featured in the Tribune each year. In 2005 there were five advertisements for dental hygiene employment (all of which were part-time positions). In the first four months of 2006 only one advertisement has appeared and that ad was for a one-day-per-week position. (Source: The Tribune classified, 805-781-7811, Cathy Hedges)

At this time there is a growing number of dental hygienists seeking employment in San Luis Obispo County. A dental hygiene school at Cuesta College would graduate 18 to 24 dental hygiene students per year.

THE COMMITTEE OF DENTAL PROFESSIONALS OPPOSED TO A DENTAL HYGIENE SCHOOL AT CUESTA COLLEGE feels that a new dental hygiene school at Cuesta is an unwise use of precious state education resources. Present labor market conditions indicate that most Cuesta College dental hygiene graduates would be unable to find employment on the Central Coast.

At this time, according to the California Employment Development Department, EDD Career Infonet, there are zero job openings within 100 miles of San Luis Obispo. (Source: <u>www.labormarketinfo.edd.ca.gov/</u> <u>cgi/databrowsing</u>) Statewide there is an abundance of dental hygienist labor in relation to employment demand. A survey of help-wanted dental hygiene advertisements on Sunday, May 7, 2006, in the Los Angeles Times, Fresno Bee, and San Francisco Chronicle netted a total of two job openings (one in the L.A. Times and one in the S.F. Chronicle).

In 2006 San Luis Obispo County Grand Jury found that Cuesta graduates far too few nurses to meet the needs of hospitals and nursing homes in this county. At present there is a critical nursing shortage on the Central Coast. Among the 50 states, California ranks last in the number of RNs per 100,000 population. THE COMMITTEE OF DENTAL PROFESSIONALS OPPOSED TO A DENTAL HYGIENE SCHOOL AT CUESTA COLLEGE feels that the Cuesta College Allied Health Department must allocate fiscal and administrative resources to expedite an urgently needed expansion of the present nursing program and defer development of a new dental hygiene program at Cuesta at this time.

We members of THE COMMITTEE OF DENTAL PROFESSIONALS OPPOSED TO A DENTAL HYGIENE SCHOOL AT CUESTA COLLEGE feel it is unwise, immoral, and simply wrong for Cuesta or any junior college to open a new dental hygiene school or any vocational training program when fewer than 20% of each graduating class will have any prospect of finding employment within a 100-mile radius of the school.

Shortage... What Shortage? Dentistry Using Imaginary Shortage to Promote Scaling Assistants

In the Irony-of-all-Ironies Department, new studies have thrown cold water on the California Dental Association's (CDA) assertion that there is dire shortage of dental hygienists in the state of California.

The source of the reports? The CDA's own research foundation!

The studies were commissioned by the CDA Foundation and conducted by the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research and the UC Berkeley's Nicholas C. Petris Center for Health Care Markets and Consumer Welfare. According to the foundation's own news release:

- The studies "indicate that the supply of these key members of the workforce is stabilizing to meet market needs, despite widespread perceptions among California dentists that there is a shortage of personnel."
- Researchers at the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research examined delays in hiring allied dental personnel, and other staffing issues, through a survey of approximately 13,600 general dentists throughout California in 2003. They found that:
 - Only half (51%) of California dentists employed dental hygienists.
 - More than 2/3 of the dentists who employed hygienists only employed them on a part time basis.
 - Only 11 percent of dentists experienced delays in hiring qualified hygienists, and only 20 percent had similar delays in hiring assistants.
 - Experiences of shortage were more frequent in Greater San Francisco Bay Area, Sacramento Area, and Southern California Counties other than Los Angeles.

- The perception of a shortage of dental hygienists and assistants was widespread, even among dentists without openings and those with openings but no shortage experience.
- "Most dentists in California believe there is still a shortage of dental hygienists and dental assistants, but these perceptions are most likely due to their past experiences," said Nadereh Pourat, PhD, lead author and senior research scientist at the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research.
- The UC Berkley report looked at trends in the labor supply and demand and found:
 - There was a clear rise in the average inflationadjusted wages for dental hygienists in 1999, which was also consistent with the perception from dentists that this was the beginning of the dental hygiene shortage.
 - The average inflation-adjusted wage for dental hygienists has steadily decreased since its peak in 2002 (\$45.69 per hour in 2002 vs \$39.51 per hour for 2005).

Visit www.cdha.org for a full listing of the Board and Council Members For years, CDA has sought to foster false fears about shortages in our profession as a way to support its arguments that foreign-trained dentists and dental students should automatically be allowed to practice dental hygiene. Now, the CDA is investigating increasing the scope of practice for registered dental assistants, allowing them to add scaling of Type I and II periodontal cases to their list of expanded duties. All this under the guise of extreme shortages of dental hygienists in our state.

Despite having the results of these new studies at their annual House of Delegates in November 2005, Dr. Ariane Terlet, former Dental Board of California member and member of the Berkley Dental Society, submitted a resolution calling for dental assistants to be able to scale teeth. In her justification to the delegates in attendance, Dr. Terlet stressed the inability of dentists to find dental hygienists because of the critical shortage. She also suggested that by allowing RDAs to scale Type I and II periodontal cases, this would increase access to care. After some debate, the following resolution was passed by the policy making body of the CDA:

Resolved, that the Policy Development Council study increasing the scope of practice of registered dental assistants to include the prophylaxis of Type I and II periodontal cases under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist following specified years of experience and additional training.

Aside from the obvious confusion of how periodontal cases qualify as prophylaxis, this means that CDA will once again direct their vast financial resources towards investigating a way to undermine the scope of practice of the registered dental hygienist. "It is disturbing to see an organization like the CDA support a policy statement that clearly is not in the best interest of the public, but rather for the financial benefit of their members," said Michelle Hurlbutt, RDH, BS, Immediate Past President of CDHA.

CDA's support for scaling assistants comes on the heels of organized dentistry's long time support for less qualified, less educated and even unlicensed oral healthcare workers. Currently Kansas is the only state that allows scaling assistants, a law that went into effect in 1999. According to Kansas state law, a "nonlicensed person may perform coronal scaling only under the direct supervision of a supervising dentist licensed and practicing in Kansas." In order to be allowed to perform supragingival scaling, an individual must attend a 90-hour course to learn about coronal scaling and polishing with both hand and ultrasonic instruments.

Recently the ADA unveiled its answer to access to care, the Community Dental Health Coordinator (CDHC). This new clinician will be trained via internet modules. According to the ADA, the CDHC will work in underserved communities with a dentist's supervision, must be competent in the development and implementation of community-

based oral health prevention (such as public water fluoridation) and promotion programs. In addition, the CDHC must be competent in the knowledge and skill required to provide individual preventive services, including fluoride and sealant applications, dietary and tobacco cessation counseling and more. The "and more" resembles the scaling assistant! Not to go unnoticed, former CDA president, Dr. Debra Finney, serves on the ADA committee that is proposing the CDHC.

What is important to note is the CDA is suggesting far more than scaling and polishing coronal surfaces, it is advocating that RDAs perform nonsurgical treatment of periodontal disease.

The CDA claims to be the "trusted source for dental information." Given the source of these studies, CDA might want to spend more time educating its members to change these perceptions rather than perpetuating a self-serving myth and continuing its campaign to undermine and usurp the scope of practice of the registered dental hygienist.
