SUBJECT: 2008 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program

DATE: February 7, 2008

Needs: For the City Council to conduct a noticed public hearing and decide which activities are to be

approved for funding with the City's 2008 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

funds.

Facts:
1. The City will have \$299,169 in CDBG funds available for activities in 2008. Of this amount, \$273,069 is the City's 2008 allotment of CDBG funds from HUD and \$26,100 are "program income" from repaid CDBG-funded residential rehabilitation loans.

2. Of the total of \$299,169 in CDBG funds, \$240,169 will be available for projects and programs, and \$59,000 would be used for program administration.

3. In October 2007, the City received 15 applications for 2008 CDBG funds. Attached are a table and a narrative "Summary of the 2008 CDBG Applications", both of which summarize the 15 applications.

- 4. Binders containing all of the applications are available at the reference desk in the Library, at the public counter/reception desk at City Hall, and in the Council's office.
- 5. CDBG regulations stipulate that at least 70% of each year's funds be spent on activities that benefit low income persons, that no more than 30% may be spent on activities that eliminate blight, and that 20% of the total may be spent for administration. (CDBG funds spent on administration are assumed to provide benefit to low income persons and to eliminate blight in the 70%/30% ratio.)
- 6. CDBG regulations also provide that no more than 15% of each year's funds *may* be used for public service activities such as homeless services, health services, programs for at-risk youth, etc. In 2008, this 15% cap would amount to \$44,875. Public service activities are classified as benefiting low income persons.
- 7. If the \$299,169 in CDBG funds are allocated per the ratios mentioned above, the allotments would be as follows:

\$195,294 minimum for low income benefit – non-public service projects

\$ 44,875 maximum for low income benefit – public service programs

§ 59,000 maximum for administration and capacity-building

\$299,169 Total

8. At its meeting of November 6, 2007, the City Council directed that the Draft One Year Action Plan for spending the City's allotment of 2008 CDBG funds include the projects listed on the following page. Note: At that time, the City estimated that the 2008 CDBG allotment would be about \$10,000 more. HUD has since issued official allotments.

\$203,050 for the Sidewalks on Riverside Ave and 24th Street \$ 46,421 for Public Services Activities \$ 30,000 for Administration \$ 30,000 for Capacity Building \$309,471

- 9. It should be noted that the City Council is not obligated to approve the tentative allocation contained in the draft plan, and may, upon completion of a public hearing, approve any of the applications and may adjust the amounts of funds to be awarded for any given activity as long as the awards comply with regulatory limits discussed in Facts # 5 and 6.
- 10. The City Council directed staff to solicit additional information from those applicants for public service grants to supplement the information provided in the applications filed in October. The information provided by public services applicants has been inserted into the binders described in Fact #4 and will be summarized in the Analysis section of this report.
- 11. A public hearing on the Draft One Year Action Plan has been set for the Council's meeting of February 7, 2008.

# Analysis and Conclusion:

#### General

There are many more applications than there will be CDBG funds to support. Criteria upon which decisions on which activities to fund are varied and complex. The criteria used by the City Council for making CDBG funding decisions in prior years include those listed below. It should be noted that the Council has not applied each of the listed criteria for every funded activity.

- Overall benefit of an activity to the City, including the number of persons to benefit from an
  activity given the amount of funds requested;
- Public health and safety benefits of an activity (including ability to eliminate blight);
- Whether the amount of funds requested is so large that, if an activity was funded, it would
  preclude other worthy activities from being funded. In such cases, the Council may wish to
  divide an activity into components that can be carried out over 2 or more years. Examples
  include the Carnegie Library Disabled Access and Therapy Pool Rehabilitation Projects,
  both of which were funded over 4 years.
- Thoroughness of an application, not only in the amount of information provided, but in the resources committed by/available to an applicant to carry out the project in a timely manner; (In general, CDBG funds should be able to be spent within 1.5 years of their availability.)
- Since 2001, the Council has made awards for public services, several of which have received more than one year's operating funds.

As noted under Fact #9, above, the Council is not obligated to approve the Draft One Year Action Plan and may approve any of the applications, provided that regulatory limits for certain types of activities are not exceeded.

#### **Public Facilities Projects**

The Draft One Year Action Plan defined by the Council on November 6, 2007 proposes the following applications be approved: (with amounts adjusted to reflect actual HUD allocations)

- Sidewalks on Riverside Ave and 24th Street (\$195,294);
- Public Services Activities (\$44,875);
- Administration (\$29,500);
- Capacity Building (\$29,500).

Not recommended for funding include the following:

- •The replacement of two offset handicapped ramps at the northwest corner of 36th and Oak Street with a single ramp positioned right at the corner. This project is estimated to cost a total of \$35,000, which could be funded with a combination of State Workforce Housing Reward (WFHR) Funds and CDBG funds.
- •Questa College Small Business Development Center's \$5,000 dollar request towards technical assistance for new and established small businesses.
- •Good Samaritan Shelter, Inc.'s \$200,000 request for development of a North County homeless shelter.
- •Housing Authority of the City of San Luis Obispo's \$50,000 request for a new office building for the Housing Authority in San Luis Obispo.

#### Public Service Applications

All of the applicants for public service funds submitted complete supplemental applications, and an analysis of these is attached. All of the applications are complete and meet federal regulations for use of CDBG funds. The City Council retains the authority and discretion to decide which, if any, of the public service applications they wish to fund. All three options assume that the Council would elect to fund all of the public service applications.

A single sub-option for allocating public service funds that would be the same for Options A and B is suggested in the table below.

The suggested awards shown above generally allot each applicant about two thirds of their request with the following exceptions:

- Transitional Food and Shelter, Inc.: \$21,375 is suggested. Prior grants have ranged between \$20,503 and \$24,000.
- Lifestyles Recovery Center: \$5,000 is suggested. Prior grants have been \$6,000 (in 2003), \$4,000 (in 2004), and \$4,500 (in 2006).

• El Camino Homeless Organization: \$5,000 is suggested. Prior grants have been \$2,000 (in 2005) and \$4,000 (in 2007).

Policy

Reference: Federal regulations for the Community Development Block Grant Program

Fiscal Impact:

Participation in the federal CDBG Program has involved and will continue to demand a commitment of staff resources. Utilizing CDBG funds avoids adverse impacts on the City's General Fund. It should be noted that any funding request that would come from administration would have an equal adverse effect on the City's Redevelopment Low and moderate Income Housing Fund or the General Fund.

Options:

Upon completion of a public hearing, take one of the following actions:

a. Option A: Adopt the attached Resolution 08-XX to allocate the City's allotment of 2008 CDBG funds, program income, and unspent CDBG funds as follows:

#### RESOLUTION NO. 08-

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASO ROBLES DETERMINING THOSE PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED WITH THE CITY'S ALLOTMENT OF 2008 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS

WHEREAS, the City has been notified by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that it is entitled to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds; and

WHEREAS, via a Cooperation Agreement with the County of San Luis Obispo (hereafter referred to as "County") executed on June 28, 2005, the City waived its individual entitlement status for a period of three years in order that the County and the cities located therein may qualify as an "Urban County"; and

WHEREAS, via the Cooperation Agreement, the City retains the authority to determine which projects are to be funded with its allotment of CDBG funds; and

WHEREAS, the City expects to receive \$273,069 in entitlement CDBG funds in 2008 and, since approval of the 2008 CDBG entitlement allotment, has received \$26,100 in CDBG "program income" in the form of repaid residential rehabilitation loans from previous CDBG grants from the State's Small Cities Program; and

WHEREAS, on or about August 22, 2007, the urban county published a "Request for Proposals" for projects to be funded under the 2008 CDBG Programs, which provided that proposals were to be submitted by October 5, 2007; and

WHEREAS, on August 29, 2007, the urban county conducted a public meeting in Atascadero for residents of northern San Luis Obispo County, including the City of Paso Robles, to ascertain the housing and community development needs to be addressed in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, on or about December 14, 2007, the urban county released a Public Review Draft Consolidated Plan, which indicated those projects to be proposed to receive CDBG funds in 2008; and

WHEREAS, on January 9, 2008, the City published a notice in the Tribune, indicating those projects to be proposed in the Annual Action Plan to receive CDBG funds in 2008; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of February 7, 2008, the City Council conducted a public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed Draft Consolidated Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of El Paso de Robles, California, to recommend that the Board of Supervisors for the County of San Luis Obispo adopt the 2008 Draft Annual Action Plan, a copy of which shall be kept on file in the Community Development Department, which shall include the following programs to be funded with the City's allotment of CDBG funds:

- 1. <u>City of Paso Robles</u>: **\$195,294**. This project is initiated by the City of Paso Robles and consists of design and construction of concrete sidewalks and related improvements within the public streets' rights-of-way along the frontage of Paso Robles Event Center (PREC formerly known as the mid-State Fairgrounds) and adjacent property. Associated improvements that typically accompany sidewalks include: curbs, gutters, concrete drive approaches, street lights, street trees, and storm drains.
- 2. **211 SLO Hotline: \$2,000.** 211 SLO requests that the City contribute a share of costs to operate their 24 hour crisis intervention, support, and information & referral service hotline. 211 SLO benefits low to moderate income persons as defined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. These persons include: abused children, battered spouses, elderly persons, severely disabled/handicaps, and homeless persons.

- 3. **<u>Big Brothers & Big Sisters:</u> \$2,000.** Big Brothers & Big Sisters requests the City to contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide program to provide mentoring services to 200 "at-risk" youth from low income households (county-wide). The funds would be used for salaries, equipment and operating expenses for one year.
- 4. <u>Court-Appointed Special Advocates</u>: \$1,000. The Court-Appointed Special Advocates of San Luis Obispo County (CASA) requests the City contribute a share (\$1,515 of \$9,450) of operating costs for a county-wide program to provide special advocates for teen-aged foster children.
- 5. <u>Economic Opportunity Commission's (EOC) Senior Health Program</u>: **\$2,000**. This program requests that the City contribute funds to share the costs of operation of a county-wide senior health screening program, which is expected to serve approximately 650 low income seniors county-wide.
- 6. **EOC's Teen Academic Parenting Program (TAPP): \$2,500.** EOC requests that the City contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide counseling and child care program for pregnant and parenting teen mothers and fathers in all cities in San Luis Obispo County, which is expected to serve approximately 300 low income persons (mothers, fathers and children) county-wide.
- 7. Transitional Food & Shelter's Motel Voucher and Apartment Program: \$21,375. TF&S has requested the City to assist in their program of providing motel and apartment rooms for those homeless that are too ill to stay at a shelter. According to the application, \$26,700 will benefit 500 persons.
- 8. **The Literacy Council: \$2,000.** The Literacy Program requests the City to contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide program to provide English Language classes to an estimated 700 low income adult persons (county-wide). The funds would be used for salaries, equipment and operating expenses for one year.
- 9. **El Camino Homeless Organization: \$5,000.** El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) requests the City contribute a share of the costs to operate their homeless shelter at certain churches in Atascadero along with the help of covering costs of providing motel vouchers for homeless that meet certain criteria. Their application indicates that about 52% of their clients come from Paso Robles.
- 10. Assistance League of San Luis Obispo County: \$2,000. This application proposes CDBG moneys to help fund the Operation School Bell (OSB). OSB provides needy San Luis Obispo County grammar school children with new school clothing and supplies. Each child receives two outfits, shoes, socks, underwear, a warm jacket, a backpack and a new age-appropriate book. All children receiving these items are referred through a County referral process, through an elementary school's administration, Migrant Education Programs, North County Shelter & Women's Resource Center, and other programs. This will benefit the low and moderate-income persons as defined by the U.S. department of Housing and Urban Development.
- 11. <u>Lifestyles Recovery Center:</u> \$5,000. Lifestyles Recovery Center has secured requested funds for operating expenses for their drug and alcohol counseling services for low income persons and for a volunteer training program. The applicant's project they will serve an estimated 200 low income households per year.
- 12. **Capacity-Building: \$29,500.** This activity is classified as an administrative use of CDBG funds. The activity consists of using City staff time to implement programs identified in the City's Housing

Element of the General Plan and in its Redevelopment Implementation Plan to benefit low and moderate income persons and to aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight. This activity will further the City's efforts to provide affordable housing to low and moderate income households.

13. **CDBG Program Administration: \$29,500.** The City of Paso Robles has initiated an application to use \$30,000 or about 10 percent of the total amount of 2008 CDBG funds to administer the CDBG program and all of the activities that are approved.

#### **SUMMARY OF 2008 CDBG APPLICATIONS**

#### **Public Facilities, Building Rehab, Economic Development Projects**

1. <u>City of Paso Robles</u>: **\$203,050.** This project is initiated by the City of Paso Robles and consists of design and construction of concrete sidewalks and related improvements within the public streets' rights-of-way along the frontage of Paso Robles Event Center (PREC – formerly known as the mid-State Fairgrounds) and adjacent property. Associated improvements that typically accompany sidewalks include: curbs, gutters, concrete drive approaches, street lights, street trees, and storm drains.

In the last 3 years, the City of Paso Robles has experienced increased pressure to make all public facilities accessible to the physically-disabled. The PREC is the largest visitor attraction in the City and has the highest degree of urgency for access improvements.

The total project is estimated to cost between \$1.0 million and \$1.5 million. Design of the improvements (including a detailed cost estimate) will be accomplished through the Workforce Housing Reward Funds (WFHR). Additionally, the project will be designed to be completed in four or more phases using available WFHR, CDBG funds, and later Redevelopment funds. The figures below reflect using the \$391,769 in WFHR and CDBG funds to accomplish the first phase of improvements.

The primary beneficiaries of the project will be the physically-disabled. Section 24 CFR 570.208(a)(2)(A) of federal regulations governing the CDBG Program lists the severely disabled as a clientele that is principally more than 51% low income. The project is also located in the City's Redevelopment Project Area, which is defined as a blighted area. The City's Redevelopment Implementation Plan, Section 4 of Chapter III, cites inadequate public improvements as a condition contributing to blight.

2. <u>City of Paso Robles</u>: **\$35,000.** The proposed project consists of replacement of two offset handicapped ramps at the northwest corner of 36<sup>th</sup> and Oak Street with a single ramp positioned right at the corner. The First Five School Readiness and Family Center to be developed on the northeast corner of 36<sup>th</sup> and Oak Street will mark new crosswalks to provide a safe pedestrian path between the new center and Georgia Brown Elementary School. The existing offset ramps on the northwest corner do not line up with the crosswalks such that wheelchair-bound and other physically-handicapped persons must cross both 36<sup>th</sup> and Oak Streets outside of the crosswalks. This project will correct the existing design.

The estimated expenditures break down as follows:

The primary beneficiaries of the project will be the physically-disabled. Section 24 CFR 570.208(a)(2)(A) of federal regulations governing the CDBG Program lists the severely disabled as a clientele that is principally more than 51% low income. The project is also located in the City's Redevelopment Project Area, which is defined as a blighted area. The City's Redevelopment Implementation Plan, Section 4 of Chapter III, cites inadequate public improvements as a condition contributing to blight.

3. Questa College Small Business Development Center: **\$5,000.** The Small Business Development Center (SBDC), in partnership with Cuesta College, requests the City to contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide program to provide training for small businesses operated or being started. An estimated 200 low income persons are supposed to be aided by this program.

The applicants have submitted similar applications for several years. The City has yet to award CDBG funds for this activity.

4. <u>Good Samaritan Shelter, Inc.</u>: **\$200,000.** Good Samaritan Shelter, Inc. (GSSI) has requested the City to participate with the County of San Luis Obispo and the City of Atascadero and contribute \$200,000 each. Funds are to be used to develop a homeless shelter and detoxification center in Atascadero. This project would benefit the homeless, which are considered by federal regulations to be low income.

Their application indicates that they expect the project to cost \$2,000,000, which will be met with a total of \$600,000 in CDBG funds (from the cities of Paso Robles and Atascadero and the County of San Luis Obispo), \$1.25 million in State Emergency Housing and Assistance Program Capital Development (EHAPCD) Grants, and \$150,000 in local capital campaign/fundraising.

This application appears to be premature for the following reasons.

- a. The applicants have not presented evidence that they have secured a zoning permit for the project site.
- b. The EHAPCD grants have not yet been approved.
- c. Federal regulations specify stringent deadlines for use of CDBG funds; they cannot be held in an approved but unused status for more than 1.5 years. Failure to comply with these regulations may result in loss of CDBG funds by recipient jurisdictions.
- d. The application states that El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) has agreed to partner with GSSI; ECHO has also applied for 2008 CDBG funds for their existing shelter operation.
- e. There application does not indicate that any other homeless services providers such as the Economic Opportunity Commission or Transitional Food and Shelter have agreed to partner with GSSI. In the absence of any such partnership, the City can expect to receive overlapping requests for homeless shelter services.
- f. Their application does not indicate how the proposed shelter and detox facility will meets its operating costs once built. Federal regulations require that property acquired and improved with CDBG funds continue to operate for at least 5 years. At this time, the City cannot guarantee that it will provide any assistance for operating costs.
- 5. Housing Authority of the City of San Luis Obispo (HASLO): \$50,000. This project proposes to use CDBG funds to assist with the construction of a new maintenance/office building for HASLO. The application notes that HASLO provides Housing Choice (Section 8) Vouchers for the County as a whole and that its affiliate non-profit housing corporation develops and operates affordable housing throughout the County. HASLO has also asked the County and the four other cities participating in the entitlement CDBG Program to contribute \$50,000 to \$150,000 each.

Presently, administration of the Section 8 Program is the only service HASLO provides to the City. In prior years, HASLO has provided assistance in administering first-time homebuyer loans. However, HASLO was paid a fee for each loan they administered. The amount of assistance requested, therefore, does not appear to be commensurate with the level of service provided.

Additionally, Federal regulations prohibit use of CDBG funds to construct or improve buildings of general governance. Since HASLO is a housing authority, it is a governmental agency, and the office portion of the building may be subject to this prohibition.

#### **Public Services**

6. <u>Economic Opportunity Commission's (EOC) Senior Health Program:</u> **\$2,800.** This program requests that the City contribute funds to share the costs of operation of a county-wide senior health screening program, which is expected to serve approximately 650 low income seniors county-wide.

The City has supported this program since 2001 and allocated \$2,000 in CDBG funds in 2007.

7. <u>EOC's Teen Academic Parenting Program (TAPP)</u>: **\$3,800.** EOC requests that the City contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide counseling and child care program for pregnant and parenting teen mothers and fathers in all cities in San Luis Obispo County, which is expected to serve approximately 300 low income persons (mothers, fathers and children) county-wide.

The City has supported this program since 2001 and allocated \$2,000 in CDBG funds in 2007.

8. <u>Lifestyles Recovery Center</u>: **\$10,000.** Lifestyles Recovery Center has secured requested funds for operating expenses for their drug and alcohol counseling services for low income persons and for a volunteer training program. The applicant's project they will serve an estimated 200 low income households per year.

The City supported this program in 2002, 2003, 2004, and 2006. (Lifestyles did not apply for 2005 or 2007 CDBG funds.) In 2006, the City allocated \$4,500 in CDBG funds for this activity.

9. <u>Transitional Food & Shelter's Motel Voucher and Apartment Program</u>: **\$26,700.** has requested the City to assist in their program of providing motel and apartment rooms for those homeless that are too ill to stay at a shelter. According to the application, \$26,700 will benefit 500 persons.

The City has supported this program since 2001 and allocated \$21,000 in CDBG funds in 2007.

10. <u>The Literacy Council</u>: **\$3,000.** The Literacy Program requests the City to contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide program to provide English Language classes to an estimated 700 low income adult persons (county-wide). The funds would be used for salaries, equipment and operating expenses for one year.

The City has supported this program since 2002 and allocated \$2,500 in CDBG funds in 2007.

11. <u>Big Brothers & Big Sisters</u>: **\$3,000.** Big Brothers & Big Sisters requests the City to contribute a share of the costs to operate a county-wide program to provide mentoring services to 200 "at-risk" youth from low income households (county-wide). The funds would be used for salaries, equipment and operating expenses for one year.

The City has supported this program since 2002 and allocated \$2,500 in CDBG funds in 2007.

12. <u>Court-Appointed Special Advocates</u>: **\$1,515.** The Court-Appointed Special Advocates of San Luis Obispo County (CASA) requests the City contribute a share (\$1,515 of \$9,450) of operating costs for a county-wide program to provide special advocates for teen-aged foster children.

The City supported this program in 2005 with an allocation of \$2,600.

13. <u>Assistance League of San Luis Obispo County</u>: **\$3,000.** This application proposes CDBG moneys to help fund the Operation School Bell (OSB). OSB provides needy San Luis Obispo County grammar school children with new school clothing and supplies. Each child receives two outfits, shoes, socks, underwear, a warm jacket, a backpack and a new age-appropriate book. All children receiving these items are referred through a County referral process, through an elementary school's administration, Migrant Education Programs, North County Shelter & Women's Resource Center, and other programs. This will benefit the low and moderate-income persons as defined by the U.S. department of Housing and Urban Development.

This is the Assistance League's first request to the City of Paso Robles for CDBG funds

14. <u>El Camino Homeless Organization</u>: **\$15,000.** El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) requests the City contribute a share of the costs to operate their homeless shelter at certain churches in Atascadero along with the help of covering costs of providing motel vouchers for homeless that meet certain criteria. Their application indicates that about 52% of their clients come from Paso Robles.

The City supported this program in 2005 and in 2007. The 2007 allocation was \$4,000.

15. <u>211 SLO Hotline</u>: **\$3,000.** 211 SLO requests that the City contribute a share of costs to operate their 24 hour crisis intervention, support, and information & referral service hotline. 211 SLO benefits low to moderate income persons as defined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. These persons include: abused children, battered spouses, elderly persons, severely disabled/handicaps, and homeless persons.

This is 211 SLO Hotline's first request to the City of Paso Robles for CDBG funds

#### **Administration and Capacity-Building**

16. <u>Capacity-Building</u>: **\$30,000.** This activity is classified as an administrative use of CDBG funds. The activity consists of using City staff time to implement programs identified in the City's Housing Element of the General Plan and in its Redevelopment Implementation Plan to benefit low and moderate income persons and to aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight. This activity will further the City's efforts to provide affordable housing to low and moderate income households.

The City of Paso Robles has annually conducted a CDBG-funded capacity building program since 1994.

17. <u>CDBG Program Administration</u>. **\$30,000.** The City of Paso Robles has initiated an application to use \$30,000 or about 10 percent of the total amount of 2008 CDBG funds to administer the CDBG program and all of the activities that are approved.

CDBG Regulations provide that no more than 20% of all entitlement and Program Income CDBG funds in any Program Year may be used for administrative purposes. Since becoming entitled to CDBG funds in 1994, the City has split its administrative allotment between grant administration and capacity building.
