# 14. Salinas River Parkway Grant - Land Acquisition Alternatives and Professional Service Contract with Land Conservancy of SLO

In 2006 the City was awarded a \$4 million Grant by the State Water Resources Board for the acquisition of approximately 260 acres of land within the Salinas River Corridor and for the restoration of portions of public property adjacent to the river and Larry Moore Park.

The City Council considered authorizing alternative land acquisition negotiations along the Salinas River Corridor, and a new contract for a portion of the grant work.

Mayor Pro Tem Nemeth opened the public hearing. There were no comments from the public, either written or oral, and the public discussion was closed.

Councilmember Strong, seconded by Councilmember Picanco, moved to adopt Resolution No. 08-060 authorizing staff to implement a contingency action plan for the land acquisition work scope of the Salinas River Parkway Grant, including the filing of a formal amendment and time extension application with the State; and authorizing a contract with the Land Conservancy of San Luis Obispo County to partner with the City to accomplish the work scope related to the land negotiations and acquisition under the Grant agreement.

Per our conversation the following is a brief history of the balloting issue to help Council recall the steps that have been taken to date and some suggestions for getting through the public hearing as effectively as possible.

## The issue:

The balloting of Sub areas 2A-1 and 112 for assessment increases and balloting for the formation of the Ashwood Drainage Maintenance Assessment District.

## Sub Area 2A-1

In the fall of 2007 I was contacted by Sue Scholl, a property owner in SA 2A-1, asking what could be done to get service back up to an acceptable level in her Sub area. The maintenance had been cut back due to lack of funds and the failure of two previous efforts to get residents to approve an assessment increase. I outlined the history and the options she had to change the service level. Once she understood the process she went to work contacting the residents in her Sub area and putting together a petition asking CC to ballot them again. The petition was submitted to Council in November of 2007.

## Sub Area 112

Again in the fall of 2007 I contacted Mike Harrod (Owner of all propertied in SA112) and discussed the fact that his current assessment is inadequate to allow us to provide full service to his new development. He agreed to support a balloting.

## Ashwood drainage assessment district

At the direction of Doug Monn I have been working with John Falkenstien to form a new Ashwood Drainage assessment district to satisfy the requirements of a flood damage settlement agreement. Mike Harrod is the sole owner of the property involved and has agreed to support the balloting required to form the drainage district.

## What has happened to date?

## December 18, 2007

City Council approved a resolution allowing staff to proceed with the formation of a Drainage Maintenance District and the reballoting of Sub Areas 2A-1 and 112. Shortly after this approval staff contacted Muni Financial and directed them to put together the appropriate documents and proceed with balloting.

## March 18, 2008

Staff presented the required Engineer's reports (budgets) and related resolutions for SA 2A-1, 112 and the Ashwood Drainage District to City Council. Council approved the resolutions allowing the balloting to commence. Shortly thereafter ballots were mailed out to property owner in the affected sub areas and Drainage Assessment District.

## May 6, 2008 What are we doing tonight?

Tonight is the official deadline for submitting protest ballots. And, as required by L&L rules a public hearing must be held to allow public testimony relating to the balloting of the two Sub areas and the Drainage district.

The steps are as follows:

Open the public hearing and ask for property owners in Sub Areas 2A-1 and 112 and the new Ashwood Drainage district to step forward and make their comments.

Once the comments are received I will do my best to answer any concerns.

After the public comment and question period is complete the mayor will make a "Last call for ballots".

Once all ballots are received the mayor will close the Public Hearing and direct the City Clerk and/or his designee to tabulate the balloting on May 7, 2008.

Lastly, the Council is asked to consider approving option a of the staff report closing the public hearing and continuing the balloting tabulation to the Council meeting of May 20, 2008 at which time the results of the balloting will be announced and the appropriate resolutions will be presented for City Council Consideration.

Re: Comments on Gateway Design Plan

Dear Mayor Mecham and Members of the City Council:

We represent Quorum Realty Fund II ("Quorum") the owner of several large parcels of real property in unincorporated territory adjacent to the southwest boundary of the City of Paso Robles. The purpose of this letter is to provide you with Quorum's questions and comments regarding the draft "Gateway Design Plan" ("Plan") you will consider at the May 6, 2008 meeting of the City Council.

Quorum's questions and comments are focused on those portions of the Plan that deal with South Vine Street and Highway 46 West. Quorum's comments follow:

## South Vine Street

- A. The first paragraph describes Vine Street as "iconic" and a "characteristic" street of Paso Robles. The Plan does not define these terms in the context of the Plan.
- B. While there may be a rural viewshed along Vine Street, all of the parcels along the corridor both within and outside the Paso Robles city limits have zoning designations that permit development. There is no analysis in the Plan of the impact of the grading standards under the Design Standards on future development along Vine Street. In many cases, particularly regarding those parcels with commercial zoning designations, development may not be possible with the proposed grading standards.
- C. There is no analysis in the Plan of the impact of the proposed standard requiring that "buildings shall be built in order to leave the ridgeline unobstructed from the downhill

view." The many variables involved in protection of ridgeline views, including the distance of the viewer from the site, the angle of the view, etc., must be considered.

- D. The "form based development standards" should be included in the Plan.
- E. The map of the realignment of Vine Street should be deleted as no realignment route has been adopted.
- F. The palette "of forms and materials described for the T2 zone" are not well described. Without an adequate description of the forms and materials, compliance will be impossible. What constitutes a "palette of forms?"

## Highway 46 West

- A. In the first paragraph, the statement that the current development at the southwest corner of Highway 46 and Highway 101 does not "act as a gateway landmark" because "the buildings are setback (sic) for from the street and are fronted by large parking lots." The parking lots do not "front" Highway 46. Further, the proposed grading standards would have made development of a hotel at the site virtually impossible.
  - B. "Suburban landscaping" is not defined.
- C. In the Design Recommendations, the requirement to develop a "country road viewshed easement" is inconsistent with the requirement that "new buildings front the highway."
  - D. The "form based development standards" should be included in the Plan.
  - E. "Village center" is not defined.
  - F. What constitutes a "palette of forms?"

As a general observation, the Plan will be very difficult to implement for the development community, property owners and decision makers. It is impossible to differentiate "standards" from "guidelines" in the document. Furthermore, the document requires that additional standards be developed to address form based development standards, grading standards, building standards, ridgeline development standards and road standards. These standards should have been incorporated into the Plan. Otherwise the Plan serves little or no purpose except to initiate another round of consultant studies. Considering that the preparation of this Plan took nearly two years to complete, one wonders how much longer property owners will be in limbo waiting for the remaining standards.

Thank you for the opportunity to present these comments. We recommend that consideration of the Plan be continued until the questions and comments raised by Quorum are answered and addressed.

Regarding Mr. App's request tonight to Authorize an appropriation of \$57,400 from Water Operations Fund Account #600-310-5224-165 for, and Execution of, a Contract with 2PointMedia for a Community-Wide Water Resource Educational Campaign, his request appears to violate the City's purchasing code as set forth in the Paso Robles Purchasing and Payment Procedures Manual (2005). I present the below for Council's consideration on this matter tonight.

## First, Section 6 Professional Services of the Manual reads:

"For the acquisition of professional services in excess of \$10,000, the executive manager shall solicit written request for qualifications (RFQ) from at least three potential professional service providers."

Ask Mr. App and Mr. Monn if they have solicited 3 written requests. I suspect not. <u>Please have the RFO's made part of the public record.</u>

**Second**, we read the following with respect to purchases greater than \$5000 (note the last two sentences in particular):

## Section 3.0 PURCHASES GREATER THAN \$5,000

Given that there are adequate budget appropriations available and that no administrative restrictions have been imposed by the City's purchasing authority, an executive manager may purchase supplies and services over \$5,000 subject to purchase order approval from the City's purchasing authority. The purchase order must be prepared and approved prior to the purchase commitment. The executive manager must solicit competitive bids prior to the preparation and issuance of a purchase order. Bid results should be attached or noted on the face of the purchase order.

Have competitive bids been solicited by Mr. Monn? Ask him. <u>Please make these bids part of the public</u> record.

## Third, Section 4.0 PURCHASE ORDERS reads

Purchase orders should be issued for acquisitions of supplies, services (including professional), equipment and/or public works projects wherein the estimated total purchase is expected to exceed \$2,500.

Purchase orders are required on professional services over \$2500. The contract with 2Point Media requires a purchase order, and hence the Council and Mr. App must ask Mr. Monn to conform to the above purchasing codes before any contract is awarded.

## Lastly, Section 4 concludes:

The City's purchasing authority may only authorize a purchase order for non-budgeted expenditures greater than \$10,000 upon full City Council concurrence.

In sum, if at least three requests for qualifications from service providers have not been made by Mr. Monn, and he has not solicited competitive bids, I conclude any Council authorization of a contract to 2PointMedia tonight is illegal. I advise you to reject Option A as stated on Agenda Item 13 until you have evidence that Mr. Monn has conformed with the City's Purchasing Code.

Second, regarding 2PointMedia's Overview, it states

## Stay Informed- The Paso Robles Water Project

In community organizing, presence is power! Campaigns must project a clear message to be effective in changing the way people think. The following strategy overview highlights the proactive and powerful campaign for the City of Paso Robles that will assist in gaining control of the current mixed messaging throughout the community regarding this project. Everyone recognizes the need for more water.

Three points should be made about this statement: First, the City should not be hiring consultants to change the way people think. At best, that is a Council member's leadership responsibility that cannot be delegated. If a Council member does not feel qualified enough to inform or persuade people to change attitudes about water costs, they have abdicated their ethical presence in the community to a mere talking head, the blind paid to lead the blind. In community organizing, true power is ethical leadership acting to inform and educate.

Second, when only one perspective on a political issue is presented to a community, it amounts to indoctrination. I assume 2PointMedia will not be presenting different perspectives in its campaign to get people "informed." If they are not doing this, why are they not being required to present different perspectives so people can decide for themselves? Education requires more than indoctrination.

Finally, I again draw your attention to the statement made by 2PointMedia. They say, "everyone recognizes the need for more water." This is an ungrounded assertion. How do they come to the conclusion that "everyone recogizes the need for more water?" Without evidence to support their statement, such statements only serve to indoctrinate, mislead and undermine the firm's credibility as adequate to conduct an "educational campaign." 2PointMedia is a public relations firms schooled best in the techniques of mind control. I don't believe City dollars should be spent on such an enterprise as now presented in their proposal.
