## 3. Mitigated Negative Declaration for Paso Robles (Nacimiento) Water Treatment Plant and Main East Pipeline

## 17. Annexation of Tract 2772-1, Tract 2772-2 and Parcel Map PR 07-0294 into the Landscape and Lighting Maintenance District

The City Council held a Public Hearing to consider the annexation of commercial-industrial Tract 2772-1, 2772-2 and Parcel Map PR 07-0294 into the Landscape and Lighting District in association with the recordation of the Final Maps. Tract 2772 is a 36-lot subdivision of a 43.83 acre site located in the south and west of the intersection of Dry Creek and Airport Roads. Parcel Map PR 07-0294 is a three-lot subdivision directly adjacent to Tract 2772. (Applicant Airport Road Business Park, LP, and Dry Creek Partners, LLC, [Mondo-Hoskin]).

For the City Council to consider a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR), and the Counties of San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and San Benito, for development and operation of a 500-bed joint re-entry facility located in Paso Robles.

## **24.** Tourism Promotion: Paso Robles Events Center Pacific Coast Cutting Horse Association

Highlights of more than 600 goals set and met in 2007-08 are: writing song lyrics, successful job searches, passing work exams, writing thank you notes, learning about food and nutrition and research on the care of a new pet iguana. Forty-one learners obtained a library card, twenty-nine read a book to their child, twenty-two received drivers' licenses and nine became US Citizens. \$4,000.00 from the City of Paso Robles CDBG funds would help us continue our work.

We serve individuals whose first language is English as well as speakers of English as a second language. We are delighted to share unedited comments from two of our learners, Firstly, Wen Hsu of Thailand and secondly from a man born in this county who wishes to be anonymous. (Not an uncommon request by our English speakers. They are ashamed of the fact that they cannot read and write. We honor their courage in seeking our help. We provide a safe, nurturing environment in which to feel proud in finally learning to read and write.)

Mr. Wen Hsu writes: before I took a class at The Literacy Council, I couldn't read or speak with confidence. The teachers volunteer their time and are willing to share their knowledge without any prejudice. I like to improve my English because I think that it will help me handle my business better and do more positive things for my community in the future. I've learned not only English, but I've learned more about American culture, history and kindness.

Mr. Anonymous reveals: I remember the feelings of being embarrassed when I first entered the office. The staff immediately made me feel very comfortable. The program is phenomenal! My self worth and self confidence are better than they ever have been Just after one year, I am now reading newspaper and magazine articles. I no longer am embarrassed or ashamed to admit that I had reading difficulties prior to the program. I know I still have a long way to go, yet I am no longer afraid to try. One of my goals is to one day tutor, and to give back to the literacy program all that it has given me.

We know that both Mr. Hsu and our anonymous gentleman will give back not only to us but also to their communities. Please help us continue to aid them as well as hundreds of other learners. The \$4,000.00 City of Paso Robles CDBG funds will directly support our learners as they acquire literacy skills. A now famous junior senator from Illinois, addressing a literacy conference, said "...literacy is the most basic currency of the knowledge economy that we're living in today."

The City of Paso Robles CDBG funds to The Literacy Council for San Luis Obispo County is a very integral component in our ability to offer this most basic currency to many members of your community. Thank you.

His Big Brother, Erik, let Jason take acting classes at his production company free. They had a showcase of Jason's acting and a graduation ceremony and Jason did great! Since the graduation, Jason's grandmother states that Erik's influence on Jason has been "extraordinary", his self-confidence has increased and he has been involved in other theatrical productions.

I urge you to allocate the full 15% of CDBG funds for public service activities. Thank you.

**Re:** City of Paso Robles Development Permit Extension Options:

Dear Mayor Frank Mecham:

Due to a prior commitment tonight, I cannot attend the Nov. 18 City Council meeting. So I am presenting the Home Builders Association's comments in writing on the Development Permit Extension Options that you are scheduled to consider.

We support and hope the council will approve extending approved building permit applications for two additional years beyond what is currently allowed in recognition of the difficult economic times facing the construction industry. As you know, most economists are looking at late 2010 or early 2011 for the industry to recover. Having building permits ready to go will help the local building community, economy and city revenues revive at that time. Such an extension will not cost the city anything other than for plan checking, and we are required to deposit money to cover these anticipated expenses when our plan is submitted.

The association hopes the council will approve extensions for:

- 1. After the plans are approved but the permits are not pulled;
- 2. If the permits are pulled but construction has not started and;
- 3. If construction is halted prior to completion.

In addition and as significant, we ask the council to extend such other approved entitlements as development permits, use permits, and subdivisions so those projects will not have to navigate the development review process again when the prevailing adverse economic conditions end. These are projects that have already met the city's land use standards, been publicly reviewed and debated, and received the approval of decision-makers. State law allows for keeping entitlements in place for up to nine years. We ask that the city extend existing approvals for three years without an applicant having to request the extension and without any changes in the remaining time that would require altering the project design or financing in the future.

Just for the sake of clarity, we want to comment on a statement in the staff report. It oversimplifies the situation to suggest that the development community is "choosing to delay construction until the economic picture improves." In many cases, this is not a choice. Many banks have stopped lending due to uncertainty in the real estate market and a lack of liquidity in the financial sector. We are seeking breathing room to keep projects afloat during these unprecedented tough times instead of having to abandon them.

City staff is concerned that extending building permits could lead to projects that do not meet the latest seismic, fire or safety codes or could result in partially constructed projects falling into disrepair during a lengthy extension time. Those situations are extremely unlikely to occur during the short extension period we believe will be necessary. The codes are updated every three years, rarely change substantially, and just completed an update recently. At most, the codes might be updated once during such an extension and very few projects would fall into the window between

the new and old codes. In addition, a building permit extension is not the type of permit that will make a subdivision risk falling into disrepair during these times. Actually, having the building permit extension available will decrease the remote likelihood of that occurring because the extension will let builders continue working on projects instead of forcing them to be abandoned.

We know these are difficult choices and complicated times. We appreciate your considering our point of view. We believe that extending the permits is a good investment for the community that costs the city little, if anything, and will prove financially beneficial for all in the long run.

While I am unable to attend the meeting, association members will be attending and will be available to answer any questions you have. If you choose to discuss this in more detail before making a decision, the association would make itself available to meet with city staff, a council subcommittee or both.
