**SUBJECT:** Community Water Rates – Public Workshop

**DATE:** December 15, 2009

**NEEDS:** For the City Council to set a date for public workshops on development of an alternative water

rate structure.

## **FACTS:**

1. Water demand exceeds supply.

- 2. On January 20, 2009, Council adopted revised water rates that would cover the costs of providing adequate water for existing customer.
- 3. That action was subject to a referendum petition and special election held November 3, 2009.
- 4. Voters rejected "Measure A 09".
- 5. Water rates pay for water for existing customers; growth is taking care of itself.
- 6. \$13 Million per year is needed to provide water to the existing community. Current revenue is just \$6.3 Million per year.
- 7. A water rate adjustment is necessary to cover the cost of providing water for existing customers.
- 8. City water cost less, than 1 cent per gallon delivered thru the tap.

## ANALYSIS &

**CONCLUSION:** \$13 million per year is needed to provide water to existing customers; current revenue is \$6.3 million.

Ratepayers have expressed the desire for "tiered water rates" whereby the price per unit of water increases with consumption. In addition, some have voiced concern for pricing supports for low-income customers.

Hosting a public workshop to discuss water pricing strategies would allow more focus on this topic.

## **POLICY**

**REFERENCE:** General Plan, Urban Water Management Plan, Integrated Water Resource Plan, and Water Master Plan.

## **FISCAL**

**IMPACT:** Hosting a workshop to discuss pricing strategies is part of the City's overall water rate study expense.

**OPTIONS:** A. Set January 6 or January 7, 2010, at 6:30 PM as the date for a public workshop and adjourn to the selected date.

B. Amend, modify or reject the option above.
