### TO: JAMES L. APP, CITY MANAGER FROM: RON WHISENAND, COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR SUBJECT: MISC. 10-001, VISITOR SERVING DIRECTIONAL SIGNS DATE: APRIL 6, 2010

- Needs: For the City Council to consider a request filed by Wine Country Alliance, to place winery directional signs at various locations within City limits.
- Facts:
  1. Stacie Jacob, from the Wine Country Alliance has provided a project description that explains the signage request and gives the background of their proposal (see Attachment 1). The Wine Country Alliance hired Kraftwerk Design, Inc., to design the proposed signs (see Attachment 3, Exhibit A), and Lisa Bodrogi (from the Alliance) prepared a graphic presentation that indicates where the signs are proposed to be located (see Attachment 3, Exhibit B).
  - 2. The Sign Ordinance provides for Visitor Serving Directional Signs, which is defined as "an off-premise sign within City limits used to identify public facilities, services, and/or recreational and visitor-serving uses as deemed appropriate by the City".
  - 3. The proposed sign program is consistent with the sign code provisions for Visitor Serving Directional Signs and also the Gateway Plan Design Standards, which calls for "a unified signage system" at key Gateway locations. (see Attachment 2). The proposed sign design was patterned after these standards and will be compatible with a master gateway sign program when developed in the future.
  - 4. On March 23, 2010 the Planning Commission reviewed the proposed sign program and recommended that the City Council approve the program, with the requirement that the sign be 6-inch by 24-inch and use the wine bottle logo on the signs.
  - 5. This application is Exempt from environmental review per Section 15061 (b) (3) (General Rule) of the State's Guidelines to Implement the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

Analysis and Conclusion:

Since wineries are a visitor serving use, the Sign Ordinance section on Visitor Serving Directional Signs applies to the proposed sign program. This section along with the criteria outlined in the Gateway Plan provides for small scale, detailed signs, which seem to fit the winery directional sign program proposed by the Wine Country Alliance (see Attachment 4).

The intent for the proposed program is to co-locate the signs on existing street sign poles (where appropriate) or install new sign posts if necessary. The potential locations have

	been reviewed by the DRC and Public Works Department, and they have determined that the proposed locations would not conflict with the existing street signs or other street appurtenances. The addition of other directional signage consistent with the Gateway Standards concept may involve some modifications to the poles and sign locations but the two programs will be compatible.
	The Wine Country Alliance proposes to pay for the signs as well as reimburse the City for the labor involved with this installation. The Alliance would also be responsible for the on- going maintenance of the signs.
	In the future, if there are other visitor serving businesses that wish to have signs, they would need to go through the City review process (Master Gateway Sign Program). The type of business/service/point of interest, size, style and location of the signs would need to be consistent with what has been established with this application by the Wine Country Alliance, and with the City's Gateway Design Standards.
Policy Reference:	City of Paso Robles Municipal Code, Gateway Design Standards.
Fiscal Impact:	Fiscally neutral. The cost of the production of the signs, as well as the installation and maintenance of the signs would be paid for by the Wine Country Alliance.
Options:	After consideration of all public testimony the City Council considers the following options:
	a. Adopt the attached Resolution approving the request to install visitor serving directional signs at the locations proposed by the applicant, and consistent with the design provided by Kraftwerks, inc., with a requirement that the sign size be consistent with the City's standard for street signs (6" x 24") with the use of the wine-bottle logo, based on the design being consistent with the design described within the Gateway Plan in the proposed locations;
	b. Amend, modify or reject the foregoing options.

Re: Proposed Winery Directional Signage

Dear Mr. Nash:

The Paso Robles Wine Country Alliance is pleased to submit an application for a total of 8 intersection locations within the City limits for the installation of Winery Directional Signage. We appreciate your support and guidance leading us to the proposed Winery Direction Sign Plan contained herein. Last fall we met to discuss the City's gateway standards and requirements to implement Winery Directional Signage within the City of Paso Robles city limits. As you suggested, we took a series of photographs and a variety of intersections for consideration which were presented to you on December 7, 2009. At that time, we mutually agreed that this was a conceptual proposal to allow city staff time to consider city requirements and parameters and for members of the Alliance Signage Committee to discuss the proposed locations.

Upon review of the original conceptual plan, identifying a series of 23 total proposed signs, the Committee narrowed the proposal down to 8 proposed sign locations. Accompanying our application is a modified power point presentation illustrating the signage agreed upon by our Sign Committee members. You will find included in the power point presentation a total of 13 proposed sign locations. This is on account of offering suggestions for consideration of alternative signage at some of the key intersections where the committee felt the community would be better represented with alternative signage in lieu of winery directional signs. In the case of 6<sup>th</sup> and Spring Street the committee agreed that a double-sided single sign directing towards Peachy Canyon Road would be preferable to a winery directional sign or signs. In which case, the Alliance would be installing a total of 7 winery directional signs (eliminating a winery sign at this location).

If the City is not in favor of adding a Peachy Canyon Road sign or signs at this intersection, the Alliance would opt to add the winery directional signage. Likewise, a two sided sign at this intersection would be more efficient and effective than adding two signs in both directions. In the case that the City will not allow a two-sided sign, the Alliance would opt for a total of 2 signs at this intersection, bringing the total number of winery signs up to 9.

### Background:

The Signage Committee met on January 5, 2010 to review the conceptual signage for the purposes of directing visitors to Paso Robles to area wineries. Committee members representing Eastside, Westside, Downtown, Far Out and Back Road winery groups reviewed a series of locations proposed for winery directional signage. The objectives for consideration in selecting the ultimate locations included the following:

- Sensitivity to over cluttering the City with too many winery directional signs;
- Financial/budgetary limitations of the Alliance;
- Only adding meaningful signage (i.e. arrows directing traffic in more than 2 directions looses their purpose);
- Limiting signage to major roadway corridors away from neighborhood corridors;
- Suggested alternative signage that would benefit area businesses and city visitors beyond just winery interests;
- Interest in guiding visitors to the downtown wineries;
- Additional interest in developing a cooperative signage plan that can be used in outlying areas to direct visitors to other downtown businesses.

We are looking forward to working with the City on this exciting proposal. We are hopeful to complete this first stage of a Comprehensive Sign Plan for the Paso Robles Wine Country by early March. 



### A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASO ROBLES APPROVING MISCELLANEOUS 10-001 WINERY DIRECTIONAL SIGNS APPLICANT – WINE COUNTRY ALLIANCE

**WHEREAS**, the Wine Country Alliance has submitted an application to install winery directional signs at various locations within City limits; and

WHEREAS, the proposal is for eight (8) signs to be placed within the public right of way; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 21.19.080.C, of the Zoning Ordinance Sign Code provides for Visitor Serving Directional Signs to be placed in the public right of way; and

WHEREAS, the Gateway Plan establishes criteria for directional signs including a suggested size, shape and color; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 21.19.080.C, of the Zoning Ordinance Sign Code indicates that the signs and specific locations need to be reviewed and approved by the City's Streets and Utilities Committee; and

**WHEREAS**, the Streets and Utilities Committee is no longer in operation, therefore, the final review of the proposed sign program is by the City Council; and

**WHEREAS**, on March 9, 2010, the Planning Commission on a 4-1 vote recommended that the City Council approve the proposed winery directional sign program where the sign would be 6-inches by 24-inches and use the "wine bottle" logo; and

**WHEREAS**, this application is Categorically Exempt from environmental review per Section 15061(b)(3) (General Rule) of the State's Guidelines to Implement the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and

**WHEREAS**, at its meeting on April 6, 2010, the City Council took the following actions regarding the proposed sign program:

- a. Considered the facts and analysis, as presented in the staff report prepared for this project;
- b. Conducted a noticed public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed project;
- c. Made the necessary findings that the signs are necessary in order to aid visitors to the community to a place of recreational importance and the location of each sign is necessary to aid in locating the visitor serving use from adjacent or nearby thoroughfares, thereby complying with the intent of the Sign Ordinance for Visitor Serving Directional Signs;
- d. That the size of the signs shall be consistent with the City's standards for street signs (6" x 24") and that the color and design with the wine bottle logo prepared by Kraftwerk Design, Inc. would be consistent with the design described in the Gateway Plan.

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e. The applicant (Wine Country Alliance) shall enter into a legal agreement with the City of Paso Robles to insure on-going repair and maintenance for the signs by the Wine Country Alliance, so that the City does not incur costs associated with the program, and to ensure that the signs are maintained in good repair and condition.

THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that based on the City Council of the City of El Paso de Robles, independent judgment, the City Council does hereby approve Misc. 10-001, approving a Winery Directional Sign program for the Wine Country Alliance, in accordance with Section 21.19.080.C of the Paso Robles City Municipal Code, based on the signs being consistent with the design provided by Kraftwerk Design, Inc. attached as Exhibit A, at the locations indicated in attached Exhibit B.


STRAIGHT AHEAD & RIGHT POINTING SIGNAGE
