#### **DISCUSSION**

Joint Study Session – Greenhouse Gas Reduction Plan
 E. Gallagher, Community Development Director

The State legislature adopted State Assembly Bill 32 (2006) which requires cities and counties to reduce their greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. The State also determined that GHG emissions can result in environmental impacts. As such, evaluation of GHG emissions has been incorporated into the environmental procedures of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Since it is a part of CEQA, development projects that require a CEQA review must evaluate potential GHG impacts. Without a GHG Reduction Plan in place that demonstrates how GHG emissions will be reduced, it would not be possible to adequately measure and evaluate GHG impacts and could potentially expose development projects to CEQA litigation. Therefore, it is necessary for the City to adopt a GHG Reduction Plan to comply with State law and so that future development is not imperiled by this mandate.

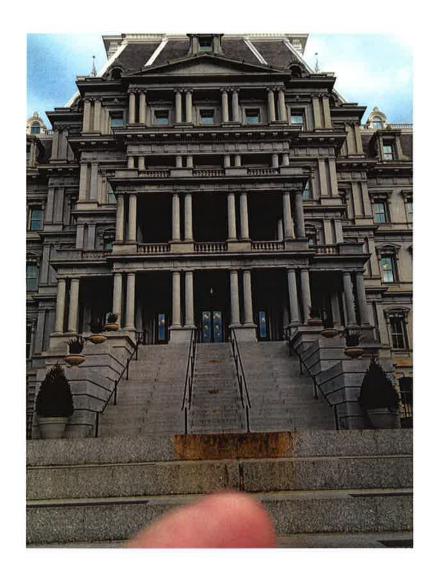
## City Council Meeting:

- 1. The Arjun Buena Vista Apt. project proposed before the Planning Commission on Jan. 22 this year: The agenda stated the item is a consideration to approve the project but what I saw was consideration for rezoning (residential single family, 1 acre lot to R3 Residential Multifamily 12 units per acre). I was at that Public Hearing for the entire length. In my observation, rezoning was not formally discussed, if at all. In the end the Planning Commission appeared to discuss how to make the project itself more palpable to the surrounding single family resident owners as a development plan. I understand Mayor Picanco was at the same meeting and he can verify to you the massive opposition from neighbors within and beyond the 300 ft. notice area. I'm asking that you consider public comment and rezoning if the project reaches your council chamber. I think it's the rezoning from R1-B4 to R3 that is the over riding issue. I don't understand rezoning being one option and a development plan being another in the same hearing.
- 2. I attended the Feb. 12 Joint City Council & Planning Commission Meeting. My husband and I are very pleased that all of you and the Commissioners were reluctant to amend or modify the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Plan. The public input was in the same court, as I am. I thought the questions and comments you all and the Commissions gave were very representative of the public at large and I thank you for that. The "Toolbox" is full of undo and unfair controls, especially in SLO County. I believe it was Councilman Martin who was able to lead the Consultants to admit that these Toolbox mandates for California are based on factors and measurements distilled from around the world. This includes third world countries who are environmentally clueless and industrial pollutants from major countries. Just bizarre we have to consider these mandates at all.

3. My husband and I really like the idea of Acting Police Chief Burton being the one who is given the position of permanent Chief of Police. The City has been through a lot with this process and he has been here the whole time. He has good reason and qualification to have put his application in the process this time around and if selected the transition is about as seamless as one could ask for. Because I sometimes volunteer for wonderful Norma Moye at Paso Robles Downtown Main Street I have had the opportunity to get to know Acting Chief Burton at Main Street functions. # Fred Strong's Report on Conferences in Washington D.C. February 10 - 13, 2013



The National Association of Regional Councils (NARC) opened its regular session at 8:30 a.m. on Monday with an update on sequestration and various issues related to NARC and its future.

We heard opinions from regional leaders that sequestration could bring many projects to a halt. We must be prepared to move ahead with less money from the Federal government.

During the session on community and economic development we heard from Daria Daniels of the National Association of Counties (NAC) that they are seeking an an increase to \$3.3 billion for CBDG funding and to restore affordable housing (HOME) block grants to \$1.6 billion rather than the \$1 billion they have been cut to. He said the EDC which creates private sector jobs is being threatened with elimination.

During the Q&A period I mentioned the changes in procedure on reporting and CDBG minimum amounts with paperwork costs of \$5,000 per grant for our city and \$8,000 per grant on the average in California. I asked that this be addressed in their efforts to keep capacity building from being impacted and also keeping necessary local programs from being eliminated from funding.

Mike Wallace, a staff program director for the National League of Cities (NLC) noted that housing and transportation are now under the same cap so that housing funds must now compete with transportation funding. He also said that transportation has the higher national priority.

The first noon keynote address was given by the Honorable W. Craig Fugate, administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). He spoke extensively about the mapping of flood prone areas and complaints received from developers and jurisdictions about the restrictive nature of its maps. He said that as much territory as FEMA maps to cover 100 year floods, "They have proved to be inadequate." Recent weather patterns are proving climate change is happening and a whole new set of criteria is in order.

He asked, "Who pays for Federal Flood Insurance?" He answered, "You do! It is only for those who can't get insurance privately. It must be actuarially sound pricing."

Due to recent resignations from the President's Cabinet we had numerous speaker substitutions. One of those was the appearance of Ms Polly Trottenberg, Under Secretary of the United States Department of Transportation (DOT). She spoke to us about MAP-21 and its underlying principles. She said that there is not a lot happening right now as the department waits for the appointment of a new secretary. She did have a Q&A period. During that time I asked four questions:

Is it possible to update and index the gas tax from its last amount set 20 years ago? She said that a national sales tax might get more traction. I asked if the blended approach to transportation might be broad enough to include ports, rail, highway and passenger needs? She said that it could and should. I asked if that included a freight component to high speed rail. She did not have an answer at this time. However, when I asked if transportation include pipelines for resources, she said it did.

Following lunch I chaired the Transportation Committee meeting with speakers from the DOT, NLC and NAC. I was assisted, regarding speaker introductions, by Co-Chairs Lyle Wray, Executive Director of the Capitol Region Council of Governments in Hartford, Conn., and Michael Parks, Executive Director of the Brazos Valley Council of Governments which covers seven counties in East-Central Texas. I also introduced the chairs of my sub-committees which include Eric Anderson of the Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG), Sharon Neely of the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), Mell Henderson of the Mid-America Regional Council, and Page Scott of the Yakima Valley COG.

This meeting was held in the main conference room rather than a side room due to the extreme interest in this topic by all regions of the nation. Approximately 2/3 of the total attendees stayed for this session.

DOT speakers Joanna Turner and Beth Osborne both stressed the cooperation between their agency, HUD and the EPA in developing application standards and process under MAP-21. They stressed that the window of opportunity for determining this criteria will take place over the next six months. Q&A centered around methods of participation and answers included workshops, webinars and written testimony.

Julia Pulidindi of the NLC and Ed Rosado of NAC stressed the cooperation they are giving to NARC with NRC staff taking a major role in determining the direction of joint efforts. Our policies at the moment are truly joint efforts

toward the same goal of retention of funding levels and establishment of sustainable long term funding for the Highway Trust Fund. Both a national sales tax and indexing of a per gallon fee were mentioned as possible avenues to seek agreement on.

That evening the Board of Directors had a dinner and social networking session at the HQ for the National Democratic Women's Club.

Tuesday morning's keynote speaker was Secretary Shawn Donovan of HUD. His message was that the President was going to stress regional and local involvement in fixing the nation's infrastructure and housing opportunities in his State of The Union address to be held that night. He said that HUD will be looking for more opportunities to help local efforts in the future.

During the Q&A I had the opportunity to thank the Secretary for the assistance HUD provided in getting the redevelopment of Oak Park initiated and requested further cooperation in the future phases of that redevelopment.

Secretary Donovan was followed by the recently hired Executive Director of the NLC Clarence Anthony. Mr. Anthony stated that he i still getting his footing and asked that we be somewhat tolerant as he settles in. He said that he is looking forward to continued cooperation with NARC and asked for more cross fertilization between the NLC, NAC and NARC on issues of mutual interest. Matthew Chase, Executive Director of NAC, stated that the cooperation between our three organizations is an important ingredient in the future success of each of us. He reiterated the importance of united action regarding MAP-21 implementation and the writing of the next reauthorization legislation.

My NARC staff Transportation Director moderated the panel on "liveability" in an adjacent salon following the keynote addresses on Tuesday. Meanwhile, a second panel discussion took place in another salon under the moderation of Sean Dey, Chairman of the Executive Director's Council. That discussion dealt with the future look of regional councils and the NARC organization. For those interested in that primarily internal discussion I will be pleased to prepare a second report.

Following these panels the conference heard an address by Dr. Mark Funkhouser, Director of The Governing Institute. Dr. Funkhouser stated that he believed that sequestration is going to happen which the administration is not happy with. According to him, sequestration was designed to be so undesirable and hated that it would motivate people to solve the problems. "It didn't work."

Neither side is willing to alter its position and it looks like they are going to intentionally create an unsustainable fiscal situation so that they can compete as to who gets the credit for pulling the country out of the mess that will result.

Marsha Howard, Executive Director of The Governing Institute, called what we are facing,"More of the same on steroids!"

She went on to say that this is an ongoing failure of government. She said that we are not "customers" and this is not Walmart. This is our method of living together and it must be fixed.

She pointed out that during this recession our citizens have lost 40% of their total wealth.

She quoted Senator Mike Enzi (R) of Wyoming as saying that we need to rise the gas tax now because the Highway Trust Fund is broke.

A discussion was held regarding our expectations for implementation of MAP-21, lead by Erika Young my staff person for the Transportation Committee.

That discussion was followed by the Board of Directors meeting. Other than continuing to have discussions with the American Metropolitan Planning Organization (AMPO) about a possible merger in the future, the board approved the budget for 2013 and the Sheraton Society Hill as the location for its Philadelphia Annual Conference and elections. Los Angeles area was also approved for the next board meeting following that conference.

The following day the Board of Directors honored a request from the White House for a briefing and workshop at the White House Office Building.

We met with Director David Agnew of the White House Office of Intergovernmental Affairs and his deputy Jay Williams followed by Deputy Secretary Maurice Jones of HUD; Deputy Administrator Theresa McMillan of the Federal Transit Administration; Assistant Secretary Joanna Turner of DOT; and three associate directors of the White House Council on Environmental Quality: Jay Jensen, Rohan Patel and Susan Ruffo.

David Agnew said the administration's primary goals for the next four years are to build the middle class, perform infrastructure maintenance, build the economy with "fair share" taxes and teach leaders the art of "The Deal."

I asked Mr. Agnew if he intended to do these things by creating larger circles that include more people rather than smaller circles that will exclude people. He indicated that attempts would be made to include as many people as possible.

Maurice Jones of HUD is a former editor/publisher who believes in providing technical assistance to regions and local governments for sustainable communities, partnerships with the private sector for comprehensive community and regional planning to provide housing, transportation and jobs.

I thanked Mr. Jones for HUD's assistance in the redevelopment of Oak Park and urged him to make sure that his regional staffs are on the same page as he is on the policies of his department.

Theresa McMillan stressed the goal of her area as safety and MAP-21 planning. She said the performance standards being developed must be complied with and that long range planning is a key element.

I brought to her attention the current situation in California and other states that are implementing pension reform. I asked that she do something at the national level to restore the frozen funding for transit projects being held up by unions claiming that pension reform violates their right to collective bargaining. I asked that projects wholly within a single state only be required to meet current State law as a matter of State's rights. I also asked how MAP-21 intended to deal with mega-region and c ross region planning and projects with the performance standards being developed. She said that these things would be looked into.

Jay Jensen spoke primarily about storm water runoff, green infrastructure and green build projects. Susan Ruffo addressed climate change.

I related the fact that some rails along the coast of California are currently only two inches above sea level and asked if her department is prepared to address this need now, before it is too late.

Her response was that we need to turn up the heat on a bi-partisan basis because the President is on board but needs support.

Our delegation met after the workshop and spent a few hours in the Sam Rayburn Office Building having conferences with our congressional delegation past and present as well as staff for the Transportation Committee and its rail subcommittee. Alliances were begun. Differences surfaced but some ideas were well received.

Staff people were anxious to share ideas and have a continuing dialog.
