SUBJECT: Street Sweeping Service

DATE: August 20, 2013

NEEDS: For the City Council to consider City Street sweeping service options.

FACTS: 1. In October 2003, City Council, displeased with contract sweeping services, directed staff to solicit new bids for sweeping and prepare a cost estimate for in-sourcing street sweeping.

- 2. On March 11, 2004, street sweeping bids were opened. The low outside bidder was for a total yearly price of \$146,000.
- 3. The staff in-sourcing cost in 2004 was \$114,000. Council decided to reestablish street sweeping as an in-house function.
- 4. Since 2008, Public Works staff has been reduced 50%. As a result some programs cannot be staffed on a full–time basis.
- 5. Currently sweeping is very limited; it is performed in the downtown prior to and after a major event, otherwise on a complaint basis as time/workload allows. Sweeping of areas outside of the downtown and in residential neighborhoods have been curtailed.
- 6. At the June 4, 2013 meeting City Council requested a report outlining options/cost to reinstitute a sweeping program.
- 7. Presently there is inadequate staff to mount a full time sweeping program using City staff.
- 8. The 2013 cost to run a street sweeper with a dedicated full-time City staff is \$185,000 per year.
- 9. The estimated cost for a contracted service is \$190,000 per year.

Analysis &

CONCLUSION: Public Works has reduced its maintenance approximately 50%. There is not adequate staffing to implement a sweeping program.

Burdened rate of a full time staff person allocated to sweeping is \$44.47 per hour (Maintenance Specialist II with Class 'B' driver's license).

Prevailing wage for contract sweeping service operators is \$48.00 per hour. A single individual working forty hours per week can sweep approximately 40 sweeper miles. Sweeper miles are approximately three times longer than a centerline mile, i.e.: it requires a minimum of two passes to clean each curb line and four if there is a center median. There are 460 sweeper miles in the City.

POLICY

REFERENCE: Purchasing Policy when contract service are sought

FISCAL

IMPACT: There are not sufficient funds to support a street sweeping program in fiscal year 2014. Cost to reinstate would have to be covered by general fund reserves.

OPTIONS: a. For the City Council to defer reinstatement of street sweeping until revenues

mature sufficiently to cover costs.

b. For the City Council to direct staff to request sweeping proposals.

c. Amend, modify or reject the above options.
