DATE: February 4, 2014

Facts:

Needs: For the City Council to conduct a noticed public hearing and decide which activities are to be approved for funding with the City's 2014 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

1. The City is expected to have \$152,240 in CDBG funds available for activities in 2013 from HUD.

- 2. From the \$152,240 in 2014 CDBG funds, \$121,792 (80%) will be available for projects and programs and \$30,448 (20%) could be used for program administration.
- In October 2014, the City received 8 applications for 2014 CDBG funds totaling \$180,000.
   Attached are a table and a narrative "Summary of the 2014 CDBG Applications", both of which summarize the 8 applications.
- 4. Binders containing all of the applications are available at the reference desk in the Library, at the public counter/reception desk at City Hall, and in the Council's office.
- 5. CDBG regulations stipulate that at least 70% of each year's allotment be spent on activities that benefit low income persons, that no more than 30% may be spent on activities that eliminate blight, and that 20% of the total may be spent for administration. (CDBG funds spent on administration are assumed to provide benefit to low income persons and to eliminate blight in the 70%/30% ratio.)
- 6. CDBG regulations also provide that no more than 15% of each year's funds *may* be used for public service activities such as homeless services, health services, programs for at-risk youth, etc. In 2014, this 15% cap would amount to \$22,836. Public service activities are classified as benefiting low income persons.
- 7. If the \$152,240 in CDBG funds are allocated per the ratios mentioned above, the allotments would be as follows:
  - \$ 98,956 minimum for low income benefit non-public service projects
  - \$ 22,836 maximum for low income benefit public service programs
  - \$ 30,448 maximum for administration and capacity-building
  - \$ 152,240 Total
- 8. At its meeting of November 5, 2013, the City Council directed that the Draft One Year Action Plan for spending the City's allotment of 2014 CDBG funds include the following projects:
  - Turtle Creek Sidewalks
- Public Services Grants
   Administration
- Handicap Ramps
- Capacity Building

- 9. It should be noted that the City Council is not obligated to approve the allocation of 2014 CDBG funds contained in the draft plan, and may, upon completion of a public hearing, approve any of the applications and may adjust the amounts of funds to be awarded for any given activity as long as the awards comply with regulatory limits discussed in Facts # 5 & 6.
- 10. The City Council directed staff to solicit additional information from applicants for public service grants to supplement the information provided in the applications filed in October. The information provided by public services applicants have been inserted into the binders described in Fact #4.
- 11. In 2013 the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) notified the County and City that substantial changes to the administration of public services grants necessary in order to ensure compliance with Federal Regulations governing the CDBG Program. These will be discussed in detail in the Analysis and Conclusion section of this report.

# Analysis and Conclusion:

# Public Improvement Projects

Please note that, although the City originally applied for funds for the Turtle Creek Sidewalks project, the City recently received bids for the Turtle Creek Sidewalk project that were lower than expected. It appears that the City has the necessary funds to complete the project without the need for 2014 CDBG funds as originally anticipated. Therefore, the Turtle Creek application is unnecessary and the Handicap Ramps project would become the priority for 2014 funds. The City could start with the ramps at 36th and Oak near Georgia Brown School, since the design for these ramps has been completed.

Option A recommends allocations to the Handicapped Ramps project.

# **Public Service Applications**

Recently, HUD has increased its efforts to ensure that CDBG recipients fully comply with a variety of Federal Regulations for such matters as income qualification, procurement procedures, accounting principles, environmental review, etc. They have applied pressure to the County (as the direct recipient of CDBG funds) to closely monitor subrecipients (e.g., the City and non-profit organizations that obtain public service grants) and maintain adequate records. These efforts also included a study of the necessary administrative tasks and costs to attain the minimum level of compliance. HUD has concluded that the average cost to properly administer any such public service grant is about \$8,000 and has directed that the minimum public service grant should be \$10,000.

The \$8,000 average cost of administration would include staff time by both the City and the County. City staff estimates that the average amount of time it has spent in the past was a little more than \$5,000 per grant. That amount would increase as the City would need to more-closely monitor grantees' performance, as required by HUD.

Many, but not all, applicants use CDBG grants to cover their own administrative overhead associated with delivering their service. In such a case, a \$10,000 grant with government \$8,000 administrative overhead is essentially equivalent to an \$18,000 grant in which at least 44%, and often much more is used for administrative overhead. It is noteworthy that some applicants use the grants to purchase goods or services that directly benefit clients and others use volunteers to deliver the services.

In 2013, the City made a single public service grant for \$25,373 to El Camino Homeless Organization for operating costs for their homeless shelter in Atascadero. The City has subsequently agreed to have the County administer this grant for an estimated \$700 from the City's allotment of CDBG Administrative Funds.

Since the City is expected to have \$22,836 to grant in 2014, its options are;

- a. Make one public service grant of \$22,836;
- b. Make two public service grants in which both are \$10,000 or more;
- c. Make no public service grants in 2014.

The City received 4 applications for public service grants in 2014. It will no longer be possible to make grants to all applicants. One of the grants (Lifestyles Recovery Center) has requested much less than \$10,000, and therefore would not meet HUD's minimum grant criteria. The other three grants meet the minimum grant amount criteria; however, the City has only enough CDBG funds to make two grants.

Option A proposes that the City do as it did in 2013 and make one public service grant in 2014. Since the City has a history of consistent support for homeless services, it is suggested that the single public services grant be made to El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) in the amount of \$22,836 for the following reasons:

- ECHO has capacity to use all of the funds within a year.
- The homeless are considered by Federal Regulations as a class of persons that are primarily low income. This helps reduce staff time in administration of the grant, as fewer variables have to be documented.
- The homeless have perhaps the most acute need for assistance. ECHOs' clients are homeless in need of shelter. The Housing Element of the City's General Plan includes an Action Item to "Continue to participate in the countywide Ten Year Plan to End Homelessness."

Option B proposes that no public service grants be made in 2014 and that the \$22,836 be allocated to the Handicap Ramps project.

#### Administration

The City's use of Administrative and Capacity-Building funds is discussed in the Fiscal Impact Section of this report, below. In 2013, the City agreed to have the County administer the \$25,373 grant to ECHO for an estimated cost of \$700, which will be deducted from the City's allocation of 2013 CDBG funds for administration. This arrangement appears to be a cost-

effective (primarily in terms of allocation of City staff resources) manner to administer public service grants.

Policy

Impact:

The City is not required to spend any portion of its annual allocation of CDBG funds on program administration. Since the City became entitled to directly receive CDBG funds in 1994, it has opted to spend 20% on administrative activities. Generally, such activities include: direct administration of the CDBG Program and the activities it funds, be they public improvement projects or public services, and "capacity-building" activities that are designed to benefit low income persons. Capacity-building activities have included staff time spend on updating the Housing Element, preparing ordinances to implement Housing Element policies, staff time spent on providing support for affordable housing projects (e.g. Oak Park redevelopment). The 20% for administration does not cover staff's time spent on all CDBG administrative and capacity building activities. That is, such activities are "backfilled" with General Funds.

Options:

Upon completion of a public hearing, take one of the following actions:

a. Option A: Adopt the attached Resolution 14-XXX to allocate the City's allotment of 2014 CDBG funds as follows:

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASO ROBLES DETERMINING THOSE PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED WITH THE CITY'S ALLOTMENT OF 2014 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS

WHEREAS, the City has been notified by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that it is entitled to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds; and

WHEREAS, via a Cooperation Agreement with the County of San Luis Obispo (hereafter referred to as "County") executed on June 28, 2005, the City waived its individual entitlement status for a period of three years with an option for an automatic three year renewal in order that the County and the cities located therein may qualify as an "Urban County"; and

WHEREAS, on May 17, 2011, the City Council adopted Resolution 11-059 approving a renewal of the Cooperation Agreement; and

WHEREAS, via the Cooperation Agreement, the City retains the authority to determine which projects are to be funded with its allotment of CDBG funds; and

WHEREAS, based on the CDBG entitlement allocation for 2013, the City expects to receive \$152,240 in entitlement CDBG funds in 2014 (which is 10-percent less than 2013 allocation); and

WHEREAS, on August 20, 2013, the urban county published a "Request for Proposals" for projects to be funded under the 2014 CDBG Programs, which provided that proposals were to be submitted by October 15, 2013; and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2013, the urban county conducted a public meeting in Atascadero for residents of the City and of northern San Luis Obispo County to ascertain the housing and community development needs to be addressed in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, on January 16, 2014, the urban county conducted a public meeting in Atascadero for residents of northern San Luis Obispo County, including the City of Paso Robles, to accept comments on the Draft 2014 Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2014, the City published a notice in the Tribune, indicating that a public hearing would be conducted on the Draft 2014 Annual Action Plan on February 4, 2014; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of February 4, 2014, the City Council conducted a public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed Draft Consolidated Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of El Paso de Robles, California, as follows:
