SUBJECT: 2014 Housing Element Update

DATE: October 7, 2014

Needs: To consider an update to the Housing Element of the General Plan.

Facts: 1. The current Housing Element was adopted by the City Council on June 21, 2011.

- 2. Section 65588 of the California Government Code requires that Housing Elements be updated per a schedule established by the Legislature. According to that section, the City was due to have adopted an updated Housing Element by June 30, 2014.
- 3. A draft updated Housing Element was presented to the Planning Commission and City Council on July 8, 2014 at a public workshop. The City Council directed that minor revisions be made to the draft Housing Element.
- 4. Following the public workshop, the City submitted a copy of the Draft Housing Element to the State Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD), for its review as required by Government Code Section 65585,
- 5. In August 2014, HCD recommended several minor revisions to the Draft Housing Element in order for it to determine that the revised draft element would meet the provisions of State Housing Element Law.
- 6. Staff revised the Draft Housing Element to incorporate the revisions recommended by HCD. The revisions are noted in highlighted text and will be summarized in the Analysis Section of this report (below).
- 7. At its meeting of September 23, 2014, the Planning Commission conducted a public hearing to review and formulate a recommendation on adoption of the Housing Element. On a 5-1-1 vote, the Planning Commission recommended that the City Council adopt the Housing Element as presented. Commissioner Garcia voted against this recommendation, stating that the element needs to be more pro-active in addressing actions to make housing affordable and providing emergency shelter for the homeless.
- 8. The Draft Housing Element update subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The Draft Housing Element does not authorize any more development

(i.e. numbers or locations of dwelling units) or change of rate of development than that established by the Land Use Element of the General Plan. An Initial Study was conducted, and it concludes that the draft Housing Element will not have any significant effect on the environment and that no mitigation measures are necessary. It is proposed, therefore, that the City Council adopt a Negative Declaration for this amendment.

Analysis and Conclusion:

The revisions made by staff in response to concerns raised by HCD (not including a handful of typographical corrections) are summarized below.

Chapter 2 (Goals, Policies, and Actions)

Action 6 (Work with developers to increase the supply of new housing): HCD recommended that this become a "one-time" action with target dates for various projects and/or phases thereof. Staff renumbered this action to Action #8 and provided target dates for phases of the Oak Park Redevelopment and Habitat for Humanity projects.

<u>Action 9 (Zoning Code Amendments)</u>: Originally, Action 9 only addressed amending definitions of "Supportive Housing" and "Transitional Housing" and adding a definition for "Target Population" to implement SB 745 (2013). However, HCD noticed two problems in the City's Zoning Code that also need to be addressed:

- Table 21.16.200 (the list of permitted uses) mislabels second units as applying to "related senior citizens" (which once was, but is no longer the case as State Law governing "granny units" changed several years ago);
- Section 21.21.160 (Emergency Shelter regulations) provides that no emergency shelter may be located within 300 feet of another shelter, however State Law provides that the City cannot require a separation of more than 300 feet.

Action 9 was amended to add the two additional corrections that need to be made.

Action 12 (Developmentally Disabled Housing): This action was added to provide that the City work with the Tri-Counties Regional Center to implement an outreach program that informs families within the City of housing and services available for persons with developmental disabilities. The program could include the development of an informational brochure, including information on services on the City's website, and providing housing-related training for individuals/families through workshops. HCD maintains that such action is necessary for compliance with State Law.

Action 19 (Housing Rehabilitation): This action was added to provide that the City work with non-profit organizations to obtain financial assistance to rehabilitating dwellings owned or rented by lower-income households. HCD maintains that such action is necessary for compliance with State Law.

Action 22 (Fair Housing Implementation): HCD recommended that this action be expanded to provide information to the public on various state and federal housing programs and fair housing law beyond merely the City's website by providing brochures, posters, etc. at a variety of other locations such as community and senior centers, local social service offices, and other public locations including City Hall the City Library.

<u>Chapter 4 (Housing Needs Assessment)</u>: The estimated number of homeless persons in the City (on Page 44) was unclear and was subsequently revised.

<u>Chapter 5 (Adequate Sites for Future Housing Needs)</u>: HCD noted that State Law requires that Transitional and Supportive Housing in all zones in which residential development is permitted. The text on Page 64 was revised to correctly state the requirement.

<u>Appendix G (Subsidized Housing at Risk of Conversion to Market Rate)</u>: The statuses of subsidies for Hacienda del Norte and Creekside Gardens Apartments were updated.

<u>Appendix L (Housing Types Allowed by Zoning District)</u>: This table was revised to correctly show that Transitional and Supportive Housing were permitted uses in the AG, RA, R-1, T-3N, T-3F, and T-4N Zones.

Policy

Reference: General

General Plan: Housing Element; Government Code Sections 65580 et seq.

Fiscal

Impact:

Housing Element policies and action items do not authorize any more development or change of rate of development than that established by the Land Use Element of the General Plan. Therefore, there will be no new fiscal impacts associated with the Housing Element Update that were not considered with the 2003 General Plan Update and subsequent amendments to the General Plan.

Implementation of some of the Actions listed in Chapter 2 will entail staff time. Generally, Community Development Department staff spends 100 - 400 hours annually on such activities. (More hours are spent in years in which the Housing Element itself is updated.) In Fiscal Year 14/15, the official hourly rate for planners charged by the City to permit applicants to recover salaries, benefits, and overhead is \$153. Therefore, the City would be expected to spend in the range of \$15,000 - \$30,000 annually on implementing Housing Element Actions in years between Housing Element updates.

Options:

After consideration of all public testimony, that the Planning Commission recommend by voice vote that the City Council consider the following options:

- a. (1) Adopt Resolution No. 14-XX Approving a Negative Declaration for the 2014 Housing Element;
 - (2) Adopt Resolution No. 14-XX Approving the 2014 Housing Element.
- b. Amend, modify or reject the foregoing option.

7. PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The City of Paso Robles has prepared a draft Housing Element to update the 2011 Housing Element as required by Government Code Sections 65588. The 2014 Update does not propose any new development that was not planned/provided for in the Land Use Element of the General Plan as adopted in December 2003 and subsequently amended on several occasions, the most recent being in April 2014. The purpose of the Housing Element is to embody the City's policies for making housing affordable to the full range of income groups defined by State Law. These policies address new

residential development, preservation of existing housing units, and conservation of existing affordable housing supply.

A full Environmental Impact Report on the General Plan was prepared and certified by the City Council on December 16, 2003. The 2011 Housing Element and subsequent amendments to the Land Use Element of the General Plan, which defined the locations, types, and intensities of residential development, were approved with Negative Declarations.

- d. Recommended that the City Council adopt the Draft 2011 Housing Element incorporating the suggested City responses to HCD's recommendations received on May 16, 2011; and
