SUBJECT: 2015 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program  
DATE: March 3, 2015

Needs: For the City Council to conduct a noticed public hearing and decide which activities are to be approved for funding with the City's 2015 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds.

Facts: 1. The City is expected to have \$164,795 in CDBG funds available for activities in 2015 from HUD.

2. From the \$164,795 in 2015 CDBG funds, \$131,836 (80%) will be available for projects and programs and \$32,959 (20%) could be used for program administration.

3. In October 2014, the City received 7 applications for 2015 CDBG funds totaling \$196,817. Attached are a table and a narrative "Summary of the 2015 CDBG Applications", both of which summarize the 7 applications.

4. Binders containing all of the applications are available at the reference desk in the Library, at the public counter/reception desk at City Hall, and in the Council's office.

5. CDBG regulations stipulate that at least 70% of each year's allotment be spent on activities that benefit low income persons, that no more than 30% may be spent on activities that eliminate blight, and that 20% of the total may be spent for administration. (CDBG funds spent on administration are assumed to provide benefit to low income persons and to eliminate blight in the 70%/30% ratio.)

6. CDBG regulations also provide that no more than 15% of each year's funds *may* be used for public service activities such as homeless services, health services, programs for at-risk youth, etc. In 2015, this 15% cap would amount to \$24,719. Public service activities are classified as benefiting low income persons.

7. If the \$164,795 in CDBG funds are allocated per the ratios mentioned above, the allotments would be as follows:

\$	108,076	for low income benefit – non-public service projects
\$	24,719	maximum for low income benefit – public service programs
\$	<u>32,000</u>	maximum for administration and capacity-building
\$	164,795	Total

8. At its meeting of November 18, 2014, the City Council directed that the Draft One Year Action Plan for spending the City's allotment of 2015 CDBG funds include the following projects:

- Handicap Ramps
- Capacity Building
- Public Services Grants
- Administration

9. It should be noted that the City Council is not obligated to approve the allocation of 2015 CDBG funds contained in the draft plan, and may, upon completion of a public hearing, approve any of the applications and may adjust the amounts of funds to be awarded for any given activity as long as the awards comply with regulatory limits discussed in Facts # 5 & 6.
10. The City Council directed staff to solicit additional information from applicants for public service grants to supplement the information provided in the applications filed in October. The information provided by public services applicants have been inserted into the binders described in Fact #4.
11. In 2013 the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) notified the County and City that substantial changes to the administration of public services grants necessary in order to ensure compliance with Federal Regulations governing the CDBG Program. These will be discussed in detail in the Analysis and Conclusion section of this report.

Analysis and Conclusion:

Public Improvement Projects

There is only one application for a public improvement project for the 2015 CDBG Program, which is to install and replace handicap ramps, sidewalks and related improvements on Vine Street, east side from 16<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> Streets.

Option A recommends allocations to the Handicapped Ramps project.

Public Service Applications

Recently, HUD has increased its efforts to ensure that CDBG recipients fully comply with a variety of Federal Regulations for such matters as income qualification, procurement procedures, accounting principles, environmental review, etc. They have applied pressure to the County (as the direct recipient of CDBG funds) to closely monitor subrecipients (e.g., the City and non-profit organizations that obtain public service grants) and maintain adequate records. These efforts also included a study of the necessary administrative tasks and costs to attain the minimum level of compliance. HUD has concluded that the average cost to properly administer any such public service grant is about \$8,000 and has directed that the minimum public service grant should be \$10,000.

The \$8,000 average cost of administration would include staff time by both the City and the County. City staff estimates that the average amount of time it has spent in the past was a little more than \$5,000 per grant. That amount would increase as the City would need to more-closely monitor grantees' performance, as required by HUD.

In 2014, the City made a single public service grant for \$22,835 to El Camino Homeless Organization for operating costs for their homeless shelter in Atascadero. The City has subsequently agreed to have the County administer this grant for an estimated \$700 from the City's allotment of CDBG Administrative Funds.

Since the City is expected to have \$24,719 to grant in 2015, its options are;

- a. Make one public service grant of \$24,719;
- b. Make two public service grants in which both are \$10,000 or more;
- c. Make no public service grants in 2015.

The City received four (4) applications for public service grants in 2015. It will no longer be possible to make grants to all applicants. One of the grants (Lifestyles Recovery Center) has requested much less than \$10,000, and therefore would not meet HUD's minimum grant criteria. The other three grants meet the minimum grant amount criteria; however, the City has only enough CDBG funds to make two grants. A summary of the four public service organizations requesting 2015 CDGB grant funds are as follows:

- (1) **CAPSLO Adult Day Center:** This program is requesting \$10,000 for their Adult Day Care program, which provides supportive day care environment for seniors with early stages of Alzheimer's or other forms of dementia or cognitive impairments.
- (2) **Senior Nutrition Program of San Luis Obispo County:** This program is requesting \$15,000 for their County wide program that provides hot meals to senior citizens.
- (3) **Lifestyles Recovery Center, Inc.:** This program is requesting \$2,000 for their drug/alcohol counseling program located in Paso Robles.
- (4) **El Camino Homeless Org.:** This program is requesting \$27,500 for their homeless shelter operating costs and motel vouchers.

Option A proposes that the City do as it did in 2014 and make one public service grant in 2015. Since the City has a history of consistent support for homeless services, it is suggested that the single public services grant be made to El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) in the amount of \$24,719 for the following reasons:

- ECHO has capacity to use all of the funds within a year.
- The homeless are considered by Federal Regulations as a class of persons that are primarily low income. This helps reduce staff time in administration of the grant, as fewer variables have to be documented.
- The homeless have perhaps the most acute need for assistance. ECHO's clients are North County homeless in need of shelter. The Housing Element of the City's General Plan includes an Action Item to "Continue to participate in the countywide Ten Year Plan to End Homelessness."

Option B proposes that the City make two public service grants in 2015 of \$12,359. Besides ECHO, two other public services, CAPSLO Adult Day Center, and Senior Nutrition appear to have the capacity to use all the funds within one year and have the staffing available to administer the use of the funds in a manner required by HUD. The Lifestyles grant request for \$2,000 could not be supported since it does not meet the minimum \$10,000 grant amount.

Option C proposes that no public service grants be made in 2015 and that the \$24,719 be allocated to the Handicap Ramps project.

#### Administration

The City's use of Administrative and Capacity-Building funds is discussed in the Fiscal Impact Section of this report, below. In 2014, the City agreed to have the County administer the \$22,836 grant to ECHO for an estimated cost of \$700 (3% administrative overhead), which will be deducted from the City's allocation of 2014 CDBG funds for administration. This arrangement appears to be a cost-effective (primarily in terms of allocation of City staff resources) manner to administer public service grants.

#### Policy

Reference: Federal regulations for the Community Development Block Grant Program

#### Fiscal

#### Impact:

The City is not required to spend any portion of its annual allocation of CDBG funds on program administration. Since the City became entitled to directly receive CDBG funds in 1994, it has opted to spend 20% on administrative activities. Generally, such activities include: direct administration of the CDBG Program and the activities it funds, be they public improvement projects or public services, and "capacity-building" activities that are designed to benefit low income persons. Capacity-building activities have included staff time spent on updating the Housing Element, preparing ordinances to implement Housing Element policies, staff time spent on providing support for affordable housing projects (e.g. Oak Park redevelopment). The 20% for administration does not cover staff's time spent on all CDBG administrative and capacity building activities. That is, such activities are "backfilled" with General Funds.

#### Options:

Upon completion of a public hearing, take one of the following actions:

- a. Option A: Adopt the attached Resolution 15-XXX to allocate the City's allotment of 2015 CDBG funds as follows:

Public Facilities: Handicap Ramps .....	\$ 108,076
Public Services Activities: El Camino Homeless Organization (ECHO) .....	\$ 24,719

RESOLUTION NO. 15-XXX

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASO ROBLES  
DETERMINING THOSE PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED WITH THE CITY'S ALLOTMENT  
OF 2015 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) FUNDS

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WHEREAS, the City has been notified by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) that it is entitled to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds; and

WHEREAS, via a Cooperation Agreement with the County of San Luis Obispo (hereafter referred to as "County") executed on July 15, 2014 and as amended on September 23, 2014, the City waived its individual entitlement status for a period of three years with an option for an automatic three year renewal in order that the County and the cities located therein may qualify as an "Urban County"; and

WHEREAS, via the Cooperation Agreement, the City retains the authority to determine which projects are to be funded with its allotment of CDBG funds; and

WHEREAS, based on the CDBG entitlement allocation for 2014, the City expects to receive \$164,795 in entitlement CDBG funds in 2015 (which is 5-percent reduction to the 2014 allocation); and

WHEREAS, on September 9, 2014, the urban county published a "Request for Proposals" for projects to be funded under the 2015 CDBG Programs, which provided that proposals were to be submitted by October 15, 2014; and

WHEREAS, on September 11, 2014, the urban county conducted a public meeting in Atascadero for residents of the City and of northern San Luis Obispo County to ascertain the housing and community development needs to be addressed in the Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, on February 23, 2015, the urban county conducted a public meeting in San Luis Obispo for residents of northern San Luis Obispo County, including the City of Paso Robles, to accept comments on the Draft 2015 Consolidated Plan; and

WHEREAS, on February 12, 2015, the City published a notice in the Tribune, indicating that a public hearing would be conducted on the Draft 2015 Annual Action Plan on March 3, 2015; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of March 3, 2015, the City Council conducted a public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed Draft Consolidated Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of El Paso de Robles, California, as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Based on an expectation that the City will receive \$164,795 in 2015 CDBG funds, to recommend that the Board of Supervisors for the County of San Luis Obispo adopt the 2015 Draft Annual Action Plan, a copy of which shall be kept on file in the Community Development Department, which shall include the following programs to be funded with the City's allotment of CDBG funds:

## **Public Facilities**

*Public Facilities are eligible to receive CDBG funds under Section 24 CFR 570.201(c)*

### **1. Handicapped Ramps:**

Applicant: ..... City of Paso Robles

Amount Requested:..... \$108,076

Activity Description: The project consists of replacing four non-ADA-compliant handicapped ramps, at the intersections of 16<sup>th</sup> and Vine Street and 17<sup>th</sup> and Vine Street, and linking sidewalks that are up-lifted, on the east side of Vine Street between 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> Streets. This project will address "removal of architectural barriers" and benefit the physically disabled, a class of people regarded to be principally low income. These can be provided anywhere in the City.

Eligibility: Public Facility (24 CFR 570.201(c))

National Objective: ..... Low and Moderate Income Benefit

Explanation..... Limited Clientele basis (24 CFR 570.208(a)(2)): Handicapped ramps serve the physically-disabled, which are considered to be a group that is principally of low and moderate income.

## **Public Services**

*Public Services to low income persons are eligible for CDBG funding under Section 24 CFR 570.201(e). The national objective achieved is benefit to low and moderate income persons in accordance with 24 CFR 570.208(a)(2). Recipients must demonstrate that 51% or more of their clients qualify as low and moderate income persons.*

### **2. Emergency Shelter:**

Applicant: ..... El Camino Homeless Organization

Amount Requested: ..... \$24,719

Activity Description: Operating a homeless shelter for individuals and families in northern San Luis Obispo County.

Number of beneficiaries: ..... 422 persons in northern San Luis Obispo County.

## **Administration and Capacity-Building**

### **3. CDBG Program Administration.**

Applicant: ..... City of Paso Robles

Amount Requested:..... \$16,000

Activity Description: ..... Administer the CDBG program and all of the activities that are approved.

National Objective: ..... Low and Moderate Income Benefit; Blight Elimination

Explanation..... Administration and Capacity Building (24 CFR 570.208(d)(4)): This section provides that administrative and capacity building activities are considered to address National Objectives.

The City of Paso Robles has annually conducted a CDBG-funded Capacity Building program since 1994.

**SECTION 2.** If, after the adoption of this resolution, the City learns that the amount of 2015 CDBG funds varies from the \$164,795 as expected, the additional or reduced CDBG funds shall be allocated as follows:

- A. If the amount of change (addition or reduction) is within twenty percent (20%) of the expected allocation of \$164,795, the City Manager may administratively direct that the amounts to be allocated to the 4 activities listed in Section 1 of this resolution may be revised in a proportionate manner and subject to conformance with federal regulations for allocating CDBG Funds set forth in 24 CFR Part 570.
- B. If the amount of change (addition or reduction) is greater than twenty percent (20%) of the expected allocation of \$164,795, the City Council shall conduct a subsequent public hearing, to be noticed in accordance with federal regulations governing the Consolidated Plan set forth in 24 CFR Part 91 to allocate any additional funds or to distribute any reduction.
